From the President's Desk

Who, me?

Ham radio is just one of my several hobbies, and I'm nowhere near as hardcore about it as a lot of our members. I also have work and family commitments eating up a lot of my time. I didn't have any major agenda to enact, and running a radio club certainly doesn't come with any great prestige, privileges, or power. Why me?



The simple answer is that it's hard to get anyone to

accept an official position in a volunteer organization. Just by agreeing to help with the web site, and showing up to the virtual Board meetings reliably, I had inadvertently marked myself as leadership material.

Now that I'm here, I intend to take the job seriously, but not too seriously. I see my role mainly as one of caretaker. Larry left the club in excellent shape. We're now an ARRL Special Service Club, and with over 130 members we're one of the biggest radio clubs in New England. My main goal is to try and keep us doing what we've been doing, and not lose any ground.

If you have ideas for projects the club should pursue, speakers we should have at meetings, events we should add to our calendar, or topics we should discuss more on our email list, web site, or in person, speak up. The HCRA exists to help its members pursue their radio-related interests, and part of my job as President is to make sure we do that.

There is one thing we need to change soon, though: we need a new Treasurer. George, KC1V, has graciously agreed to extend his term until we find someone to replace him, or until the end of this year, whichever comes first. We can't run the club without a Treasurer, so this is an urgent need. If you can manage a spreadsheet, submit a report about it once a month, and be trusted not to steal, you're qualified. Please step up!

Now let's talk about radio stuff. I had big plans to do a bunch of SPOTA activations this summer, but between blazing heat, pouring rain, and a deluge of other commitments and distractions, all I've managed to accomplish so far are a few minor repairs and updates to my gear. I'm hoping autumn will bring better weather and more free time. How about you? Did you do any portable operating recently, and if so, how did it go?

The big club event this summer was, of course, Field Day at School Street Park in Agawam. Josue, KP1JLD, did an amazing job organizing it. Despite some of the worst Field Day weekend weather in recent memory, a lot of folks showed up and had fun. We all learned a lot, too - especially about the importance of weatherproofing our outdoor operations and preparing for the unexpected. Our

We're already talking about next year's Field Day, including the possibility of entering as a QRP/solar operation. This is just a preliminary idea right now, though, so if you want the club to take a different direction for Field Day, let us know.

Coming up, Ez, W1AEZ, is organizing a combined cookout and operating session this October. This will be a casual event. Bring a portable setup if you have one, or just show up and enjoy some food and camaraderie. Ez is still finalizing the details, but we'll post all the information on the HCRA web site and email reflector, so watch for those updates.

Be sure to take a look at page 5 in this issue for a report on a POTA road trip a few club members took recently. Looks like they had a blast!

I also want to congratulate Ken, KD1KU. See page 8 for the news, but suffice it to say that you're reading the #1 ham radio newsletter in New England! That's entirely Ken's doing.

This month, we have our September meeting on the 6th. It will feature a talk by Orv Beach, W6BI, one of the main developers of the Amateur Radio Emergency Data Network (AREDN). AREDN nodes have sprung up in many areas of the country, especially out West, allowing hams to maintain their own high-speed digital networks independent of commercial infrastructure. These systems operate on microwave frequencies, with enough bandwidth to carry live video and full-duplex audio. This is cutting-edge stuff, and it should be a very interesting presentation.

We'll have another cutting-edge, or at least extruding-tip, talk at our October 4th meeting, when our own Jeff Bail, NT1K, will tell us how we can use 3D printing for our ham radio projects. Why buy a case that kind of fits your circuit board, when you can print one to fit it exactly? This is a technology I've been eyeing for years, and it seems as if the latest generation of printers has finally matured to a point where I might take the leap and buy one. I'll wait until I've heard what Jeff has to say first, though.

The 2025 meeting schedule still has a few openings. We have a couple of speakers lined up but not scheduled, and are looking for more. Is there some topic you want to hear more about? Someone you met at a hamfest who seemed like they'd be a great speaker? Drop a line to our Programs officer, Gary, AA1UE, and let him know.

We decided to do another activation since we were having so much fun. We worked our way to Satan's Kingdom Wildlife Management Area in MA. Off we went.


We got set up along side the road across from the area (swamp). We couldn't safely park next to the swamp, so we parked across the street.



1. Alinco DM-330MV, 32A, 16 VDC variable power supply. Hardly used. At 32A, it has the capacity to easily power a 100w radio, and being variable from 0 VDC to 16 VDC, it's a very good bench power supply to power radio projects, \$35 or BO.

2. SCG SG-230 Smart Tuner remote tuner for 160M through 10M, 10w to 150w. Will tune almost any kind of antenna. I used it with an off-center fed dipole through 50' of ladder line but can be used with just a single wire random length antenna, or most anything else that will radiate. It's designed for outdoor use in a weather proof housing, \$35 or BO.

3. Simpson 260 multimeter (a classic) – needs a new rectifier for AC measurements, works fine for DC, resistance, etc. With leads, \$20 or BO.

4. 8' copper clad steel ground rod with clamp – new, never used, \$5

5. Two 10" screw in type ground anchors – great for antenna guy wires, \$2
