Larry's still around but busy with other things, such as helping to run HamXposition and working as the ARRL's Affiliated Club Coordinator for Western Massachusetts. Having run the club for a year, it's now time for me to pass the torch.

I'm not planning to disappear, though. Ken, KD1KU, is stepping down from editing Zero Beat, and as I learned earlier this year, I have at least some of the specialized skills needed to fill that role.

Ken is officially the best ham radio newsletter editor in New England, so he'll be a tough act to follow, but I'll give it a shot.



So who will be President? Good question. Ideally, someone with experience on the Board of Directors of a club like this will volunteer to run for the office. Maybe a current or former HCRA Board member will step up.

For that matter, we also need to fill the other Board positions. Most of the current leadership is willing to stay on for another year, but we'd love to have some new faces join us as well.



Field Day 2025: We're Bringing It Back


It's a contest that's not a contest. It's an emergency communications drill, a cookout, a public relations stunt, and a social event. Some people treat it as an all-weekend endurance test, while others just spend an hour operating casually in a park one afternoon. There's one thing we can all agree on, though: ARRL Field Day is the biggest amateur radio operating event of the year.

Always held on the last full weekend in June, Field Day looks like a radio contest, but officially it's an "operating event." What the heck does that mean? It means everyone can enjoy it in their own way. There are scores, and serious radiosport competitors will of course try to maximize theirs by making as many contacts as possible.



While the scoring serves to motivate many people, it's not really the main point. Field Day is, above all, a celebration of amateur radio in all of its breadth and depth. It's one weekend a year when we can all geek out about our own special interests, discover how others pursue this hobby, and show it all off to the public.

So how does HCRA celebrate this event? The club has a longstanding tradition, dating back to its earliest years, of putting on a major operation for Field Day. Our operating site has moved around a few times, but for the past decade or so we've been setting up in School Street Park in Agawam, MA. (see below) It's easy to reach and spacious, and the Agawam Parks Department has been extremely accommodating. Before 2020, the HCRA operation most years was a big deal. We'd raise multiple 50-foot towers with beam antennas, fill the operating schedule to keep CW and SSB stations on the air for the full 24-hour contest period, and also score as many bonus points as possible. **We still have all of the equipment to do that**.

Since the pandemic, though, our Field Day operations have been much smaller. We didn't get together as a group at all in 2020, of course, and in 2021 we still had to be very careful about infection control, which limited our options. Field Day has been recovering slowly ever since. Last year, the weather didn't help: heat indices over 100 degrees alternated with frequent severe thunderstorms all weekend. Nonetheless, about a dozen of us braved the scorching heat and driving rain, and we managed to have fun despite the brutal conditions.



This year, we're hoping a bigger turnout will allow us to do more. Here are five reasons you should attend:

1) Hang out with people who share a common interest

Whether you've been an HCRA member for decades or just joined, Field Day is a great opportunity to chat with your fellow club members. We come from a wide range of backgrounds, have many different interests, and seldom bite.

2) Get on the air!

We'll be operating under the W1NY club callsign, and a General class or higher control operator will be on the site for all of our operations. For newly licensed Technicians, that means you can operate on HF frequencies and modes that would normally be outside your operating privileges. See what all the HF contesting excitement is about!

3) Try something new!

The Field Day bonus point system means we'll be doing lots of different things. Field Day is the best opportunity to explore other ham radio niches. Maybe you're an old hand at HF DXing but have never tried passing an NTS radiogram or making a satellite contact. With bonus points on the table, we'll try to arrange those activities and more.

4) Learn or practice a skill

We'll be setting up antennas, solving little (and possibly big) problems, and showing off lots of different techniques and technologies at Field Day. If we have enough people, we may also have a little lesson of some kind. Last year, Bob, K1YO, demonstrated HF direction finding, and this year we might try to teach something else. Come learn with us!

5) Get a taste of emergency communication

While we certainly hope we don't repeat the 1954 HCRA Field Day, which ended with club members sifting through the charred wreckage of a major structure fire (seriously, check the archive), Field Day is nonetheless an opportunity to practice for emergencies. By setting up stations away from commercial power sources and testing our ability to communicate over both short and long distances, we'll be better prepared for all kinds of disasters.

By setting up stations away from commercial power sources and testing our ability to communicate over both short and long distances, we'll be better prepared for all kinds of disasters.

So come join us in School Street Park in Agawam, MA on Field Day weekend. We plan to start setting up a tower and antennas on Friday afternoon, June 27. Operation will start Saturday afternoon, so we want everything in place and tested well before then.



Once we're underway, we hope to keep at least two stations going for the next 24 hours while also racking up as many bonus points as we can. We'll need people to stay in the park overnight Friday and Saturday, either in tents or RVs. On Sunday afternoon, we'll take everything down and pack it away.

School Street Park isn't wilderness. There are restrooms near our operating site, plus restaurants and stores in the neighborhood, and we always grill up a good lunch for everyone present Sunday afternoon. If you can't make it for the whole weekend, just come out when you can. We'd love to see you for an hour if that's all you have available, and whenever you get there, we'll likely have something interesting going on.

Let's do this!

Getting Started in Foxhunting

Hampden County Radio Association is sponsoring radio direction finding as a recreational activity to be enjoyed by all amateur radio enthusiasts, regardless of your experience or membership. Starting in May 2025, HCRA is offering training sessions, workshops, and beginner-friendly events to help newcomers develop their skills.

What's foxhunting? It involves locating hidden radio transmitters, often referred to as "foxes," using specialized equipment and techniques. No, not real foxes, but a hidden radio transmitter where we get to play hide-and-seek, where one person hides a radio transmitter and others try to track it down. This is accomplished by detecting and analyzing the signal's strength, phase, or polarization as it is received by specialized equipment.

For those interested in joining the foxhunting community, the first step is acquiring basic equipment. The key components include portable radio receivers capable of turning to the frequency of the hidden transmitter, which are essential for detecting and analyzing signals. Directional antennas are designed to focus on signals from specific directions and are used as the primary tool for locating the "fox."

Common types include Yagi antennas, loop antennas, and ferrite rod antennas. HCRA is encouraging hunters to build their 2m Yagi antenna, and handouts are available with part listings with prices as well as kitbuilding instructions. Signal attenuators help control the strength of received signals, preventing overload and enabling participants to refine their search. Lastly, maps and GPS devices as navigational tools assist foxhunters in plotting their course and marking potential locations for the transmitter.

These foxhunts will typically be on Saturday mornings, where a transmitter will be hidden within a defined area, such as a park, forest, or urban space within Western Massachusetts counties. The sport combines elements of outdoor adventure, technical skills, and teamwork, offering participants the opportunity to test their problem-solving abilities in a dynamic and challenging environment. The initial fox hunt will be on foot with only one FB transmitter at a park where hunters can tune into the FB frequency and walk around listening for the tone. The following foxhunts will begin to get a lot more complex, where participants get to drive around to hunt the fox.

Fox hunting is a fun way to improve your ham radio skills. Join a ham radio club near you to connect with local hams you can go fox hunting with. I'm thrilled to have one in my community now that I can learn from. The goal is to build your confidence and test your equipment to become familiar with the steps in the foxhunting process of signal detection, direction finding, navigation, and confirmation of locating the Fox Box. Most of all, as radio enthusiasts, we want all participants to have fun while being part of a vibrant and supportive community, no matter your experience or club membership. "Happy Hunting"

The First Long Range Fox Hunt, 1983

On July 17, 1983, the 1st annual long-range foxhunt/picnic was held.

The foxes were N1CDR, Mickey, and WA1CTQ,

Phil. As most of you know, our foxhunts are limited to a 10-mile radius around Mt. Tom, but not into Mt. Tom. WA1CTQ: The July 17th Fox Hunt was held with an unlimited distance, but still the fox was required to put out a readable signal on the 146.340 repeater input.

The following was recorded by Phil, WA1CTQ:

After several years of fox hunting and many bull sessions about all of it, we decided to hold a long-range, unlimited-distance fox hunt in conjunction with our MTARA-sponsored picnic. It was agreed that Mickey and I would be the

foxes. Mickey and I had originally planned to be at his campsite in New Hampshire and use an 11-element beam to transmit to Mt. Tom. Well, the folks up there who own the place were cool to the idea, so we decided to look around for a different spot. Mickey travels around a bit, as he's a salesman for TEK Bearings out of Springfield, Mass. He looked around a while, and it was a bit of a toss-up between Look Park in Florence, Mass., the Greylock Tower in Pittsfield, or the Northeast Utilities picnic area in Bernardston, Mass. We decided on the North East Utilities site due to the picnic tables and fireplaces and generally easy access from north or south. We checked out the workability of the repeater from there, and it was a go. So all was ready for the big day. We did a lot of yakking about this event for a couple of months before the big day, so a lot of people were really ready and up for it all.

The big day dawned sunny and bright, which was an order to Mother Nature from me! Mickey and his XYL, Joanie, drove down from his campsite in New Hampshire, and the XYL (Helen) and I left the home QTH at 7:30 AM with the hot dogs, hamburgers, and all of the other goodies needed. The gate was locked until 9 AM, so the first transmission was done from my car with 25 watts. This fox hunt was 'transmission by request,' but the first couple of transmissions were given out for free. All the subsequent transmissions had to be requested, and five minutes of time was tacked on to the requesters' time! All the reports told us we were unreadable by any of the hunters or bases, so we decided to plug in the 100-watt amplifier! We had gotten everything all set up for a really high-power transmission when KA1JJM, Ray, said he got a bearing of north. So it was decided not to tie on the amplifier but to continue using the KDK barefoot (15 watts), and the hunt was on in earnest!

The foxes had settled down with coffee and some goodies when the call came for a transmission from KA1JJM. So we gave him 5 minutes' worth of travel time and 1 minute of RE. Everybody heard us this time, including a base station in nearby Greenfield. I think it was K1PCW—Ely. Also, a base station in Vermont working with the Hamden Connection of N1OET, N1EDH, W1UPH, and W1UFF heard us but reported it only to his partners. We fully expected to see KA1JJM come rolling in as soon as we heard him turn east on Route 2 from I-91 at Greenfield, but it wasn't to be. The Hamden Connection did their homework well and had sent one of their hunters (W1UPH) north to start the hunt from Hatfield. We had only suggested that everybody start from the Ingleside Mall due to its easy access to I-91, both north and south, and I-90, both east and west.
