Starting this fall we hope to have a kit building session as well as others to share with everyone. Stay tuned.

June is here and that means Field Day 2019 is right around the corner. Field Day is a fun and exciting way to push your hobby limits. We operate from a field using generator or other power other than AC. We put up temporary antennas and shelters. It's a time also to get new hams introduced to contesting and HF operation. It's also a time to possibly be introduced to new to you modes like satellite or cw or digital. It's a time to be *excited* about ham radio.

This will probably be at least my 36th Field Day. It's always an exciting time and always leaves great memories. My first FD (Field Day) weekend was as a Novice with the now defunct Provin Mountain Repeater Association. I remember being in a Boilard Lumber box truck listening to cw and having a Elmer (old word for mentor) standing behind me saying "GO". I was 14 years old and super reluctant. Eventually I answered and after being coached thru a few more contacts I was off. Boy oh boy did I have a blast. I was hooked.

Since then I've done FD's with the above club, many with the MTARA, a few with the Bear Bait Radio Club of the Adirondacks, a few with friends and many with the HCRA. My wife Faye knows the last full weekend in June is "always" reserved for ham radio Field Day.

You too can start making FD memories. There are many aspects of the whole Field Day experience. Some like hardware and help set up and tear down. Some like operating, some like volunteering to help run things. Some like it all and participate in everything. Some just visit. What would you like to do?

Last years FD chair stepped down and into other much larger responsibilities. I stepped up to run FD in his place. We have chairs for towers, antennas, food, logging and networking, technical, message handling and info board. We have 2 generators committed and those 2 little Honda's run quietly all weekend and sip fuel sparingly.

Here's a list of what is still needed. Can you help out?

Publicity – someone to notify TV, radio and newspapers of our FD event

Education – plan something at our FD site (Technical may do this, maybe run a foxhunt)

Band Captains for the 3 main bands: 40 cw, 40 ssb, 20 ssb

Operators for all modes and all bands

ARRL Field Day

HCRA will be operating 3 stations (40M CW, 40M SSB, 20M SSB) in the same place as last year. Operation will be beginning at 1800 UTC (2 PM local) Saturday and running through 2059 (5PM local) UTC Sunday. All the rest of the info or Field Day can be found at <http://www.arrl.org/field-day>.

Here is where we will be—School St Park in Agawam:

You can park in the lot off School St, or the one off Corey St. This is a playground and family park, so be mindful of the other users of the facility. **Alcohol is not allowed in the park.**

The pavilion that is circled will be the area that the stations, food, chairs, tents, etc will be



located. The antennas will be going up on Friday afternoon in the baseball field, and will need several hands to help. There will be 3 50ft towers to assemble, raise, and tie down. There will also be assembly of the tri-banders, and the other antennas. If you've never setup a larger antenna, this is an opportunity to be part of it.

We will be open to, and encouraging the general public to stop by, and learn about amateur radio. This is a large part of what Field Day is all about. If someone asks about what we are doing, be encouraging, share our knowledge, and we will have handouts to help spread the word.

HCRA will provide coffee, water, and some food for the grill for volunteers. Please help by bringing a dish to share, or snacks, etc. Contact me (N1JIE@arrl.net) to coordinate things so we don't end up with 2000 cookies. Other items needed: Cases of water, gatorade, diet coke, coke, mountain dew (diet too). 2 liter is nice, but cans and smaller bottle much handier for those operating and working there. Salad and dressing, side dishes like casseroles, etc, desserts & snacks - finger food for those staying is great, Sturdy plates & cups, Silverware, Napkins and paper towels, Need to borrow coolers for soda and other things that need to be kept cold, Ice for coolers (bring a cooler, fill with some ice please). We will have electricity for crock pots, and limited refrigeration.

We need volunteers—this is our big outdoor event! Operate, setup, cleanup, hang out and visit, anything that you want. Want to volunteer? Email W1AST@arrl.net with what you would like to do. Volunteers will be entered into a drawing to get a nice SDR USB radio (not the little cheap one, but a *nice* one).

If you want, several of us will be camping. Bring a small tent and sleeping bag, catch a nap early, and then get up for the nighttime 40M openings!!

Sunscreen, bug spray, drinks, etc are a must. If you want to sit, please bring a comfy folding chair. We hope to have nice weather, and being outdoors can dehydrate, cause sunburn, and skeeters and no-see-ums can take the fun out of a great time. Be prepared!

As Larry mentioned—he has been doing this a long time. This is my second one—and I had a total blast last year. I was on the air for several hours, working with other club members, till I had a sore throat by morning. Loved every minute of it, and it made me SO much more comfortable operating my own station. All the new hams, especially the Technician licensees—you will be operating under the club license, with full band privileges. This is the opportunity to play in the other end of the pool, and get to know HF a bit. Come join us.






Jerry decided to take a break after setting up the station for Field Day

ARRL STUFF

Things are happening in the world of Amateur Radio. ARRL is our advocate for Government, education and organization. I hope everyone that is a member of HCRA is also a member of ARRL.

Conventions and Hamfests:

Dayton, OH / NEARfest / Boxboro / MTARA—all are gatherings of Hams, a swapmeet, some have classes and presentations, most have exams. This is part of amateur radio, where we meet and greet, get supplies and look over new gear, visit with vendors, and catch up with friends new and old.

So how do you find these activities? Well, a good start would be your local club newsletter, and for a larger look—go to <http://www.arrl.org/hamfests-and-conventions-calendar>. You can search by location, dates, etc. Going to visit your uncle in Peoria? Look and see if there is a hamfest while you are there. You could meet some new folks, or find that rare tube you need to get that boat anchor under your bench working again.... Or get another boat anchor!!

Registering, tracking and publicizing these fun gatherings is part of ARRL. Check one out if you haven't already!

ARRL Licensing:

Volunteer Examiners are just that—they help administer the licensing exams, as volunteers. There is a book to study, a test to take and send in to the ARRL, and a bit of paperwork. But each exam requires a minimum of 3 VEs, at the level being tested. So if someone wants to take an Extra level test, 3 Extra level VEs must be there to grade the exam. As you know, there is an exam every month at the same place as our meeting. Also, Jeff NT1K and his group do quarterly (free exams). And think of all the other locations—each needing VEs to proctor, grade and process the exams.

There is even a list of top VEs, by how many sessions they have participated in. One of our members, Jim Mullen, KK1W, is on the ARRL VE Honor Roll for New England (323 sessions and counting). Another local, Stefan Radowicz, N1SR from Chicopee is on the list.

So that license you got—well, several people, generally all ARRL members, volunteered to help. Now that you have the ticket, think about helping someone else go for the ride!!

ARRL Magazine—QST

So, what do you get with ARRL membership? QST magazine, both print and electronic. Loaded with articles, equipment tests, updates on legislation, dxpedition reports, contests, product testing and reviews and lots more. Yes, there are ads from many of the radio vendors, and while many are big multi page ads, there are smaller ads from the little guys. Want to know who to contact for your division or section about something? But you forgot who it was? —well all the contact info is there. Antenna designs are another big topic—usually with instructions, parts lists, and testing to prove that it works. Did you know that ARRL conducts an antenna design contest each year—results are in QST, with plans and testing. You ain't gonna find that on the magic antenna you saw on ebay!!

Not having the space or money for a SteppIR (a FINE antenna) I like to try simpler stuff. I've got a copper pipe j-pole for my UHF/VHF base. Got a G5RVjr for HF. I built a 20M spiral dipole that worked (see Show and Tell). I'd like to put together some others. This site has several projects, and if you are interested in DIY antennas—there are tons of designs out there.

So whether you use this site, or others, a google search or an ARRL book or QST design, look into building your own antenna. Trust me, when you make that DX contact, on an antenna you built, you will jump around the shack and giggle like a little girl too.... Right, Harold?
