May 2020 HCRA Presidents Message

I am writing this in mid-April. By now most of us have been in a home, self quarantine for a month or more. I run a home based business, so being home is not an adjustment for me. Having my wife Faye home at the same time is a slight adjustment. She works from the opposite end of the house.

I have been hearing from others that being home is making them crazy for many reasons. Either the quiet, the lack of others around them, the inability to concentrate, lack of work, increased distractions or inability to work with their kids home and so many other reasons. Some are lack of work. Or just more free time.

Lack of work and extra free time means more time for fun and interesting things, like ham radio. The HF bands have been pretty active and I keep hearing about openings on 10 and 6 too as well as other bands. I've been listening to DMR and have caught some of you on some of the talk groups. This extra time could be a good time to learn cw or improve your cw skills.

Try one of the Long Island CW Groups classes. I hear they do a heck of a good job teaching cw. ARES in the area is making a return and they are looking for more help. Contact K1YO or AA1WH for more info. If you don't want to make any noise, headphones and cw are a good choice or one of the digital modes are even quieter. So many choices.

One of the ways Faye (my xyl) and I have been getting out of the house safely while still social distancing ourselves is by going fox hunting in CT on the weekends. The ctfoxhunter group has 2 to 4 foxboxes that they hide each week. Each foxbox is in a ammo can with a radio, battery and some sort of antenna. They are hidden in the woods and locked to a tree or other object so it can't be stolen.

By watching the group, we can gather what town and where in that town is a good place to be to take a reading. We'll find a place where we can activate the foxbox and take a reading. We then pick a spot to take the next reading and repeat. Last week we were in Bolton Notch State Park in Bolton, CT and in Manchester, CT. Both were walk up foxhunts. We activated the foxbox and walked and repeated until we found it. The one hidden in Manchester had us a ways into the woods. Lots of trees, but the antenna pointed right at the foxbox which was covered with branches and hidden very well. But finding it with a tape measure beam and offset attenuator was easy and fun. We do this every weekend.

Finding those foxboxes in CT is great. But we'd like to do so in the CT River Valley too. I know there are many people interested in the Springfield area but they don't want to drive to central CT to find those foxes. The HCRA is doing something about that.

The HCRA is assembling a foxbox of it's own. It's our first one and all those in the assembling and programming of it are very excited that soon, we'll be doing hunts here too. We also think if interest is high enough, we could add one or maybe two additional foxboxes to make it even more interesting.

This would give you a reason to safely get out of your house by yourself, with your spouse or maybe a fun activity with your kids. It's something you can share with your family and who knows, maybe enough to spark that interest in ham radio. It's an activity we could do at Field Day or as a demo with scouts or other youth groups. The possibilities are endless.

How do we activate the foxbox? On the set simplex frequency, I ID, press a certain tone and a have the PL all set and IF the foxbox can hear you. It will transmit a series of tones and then ID itself. The HCRA foxbox will do the following:

A series of tones, then ID in CW with "WB1Z HCRA FOX HUNT"

WB1Z is one of the club calls. For those that do not know, WB1Z belonged to a club member; Jim Allen; who died way too young from cancer. He was an avid foxhunter. His widow allowed us to take his call to honor him. WB1Z rarely gets used when compared to the main club call; W1NY. By putting his call on the foxbox will put the call to good use and one Jim would be proud to have his call associated with.

If all goes well, by the time you are reading this, the foxbox will be in it's first hiding location waiting to be found.

How will you know when the foxbox has been hidden? Or how to trigger it? Announcements will be made on the HCRA Facebook page and email list when it's been placed. If you are interested in watching others or helping to find or go out and find the foxbox, you should join the new group WMAFoxHunters at: <u>https://groups.io/g/WMAFoxHunters</u>

Click on messages and watch the posts from the hunters. Posted there will be how to activate the foxbox. You can try to key it from home and if you can, announce that to the group so the hunters know where approximately to start their hunt.

Think of it as a search and rescue practice or a geocache that transmits so you can find it. It's a ton of fun. I do hope to see you out there; from a distance of course. Do post your finds with a picture, but do not tell the location so you do not spoil it for others!

It's time to get excited about Field Day weekend. June 26-28th. As of right now, we are planning for FD. Hopefully it will happen and we'll be able to hold it at our usual location, the School Street Park in Agawam. Mark your calendars, reserve that weekend to join us for a fun filled, ham radio weekend. It's always a great time. I think this may be my 36th Field Day!

The trailer inventory and organizing has been rescheduled. The new date is Sunday, June 14th at 10 am with a rain date backup of Saturday, June 20th at 10am. It should not take long at all based on the two hours from last year. The location is AA1YW's house in Southwick. Your help is appreciated. ARRL STUFF

Things are happening in the world of Amateur Radio. ARRL is our advocate for Government, education and organization. I hope everyone that is a member of HCRA is also a member of ARRL.

<u>Alternate Field Day methods</u> – with the current covid-19 restrictions in place, many are considering operating separately during Field Day. There may still be restrictions in place at that time (June 27, 28) that will prevent clubs from operating as a group in a public place. ARRL has some guidance (<u>http://www.arrl.org/news/field-day-2020-a-time-to-adapt</u>) in last week's newsletter to members and on the website to adjust and adapt to the new restrictions and these are some thoughts from a couple of us.

Location

- Permission check with owner / city / town well prior to setting up. If it's not your yard, you need authorization to setup.
- Setting up in your yard has many advantages no travel, under your control, kitchen nearby, support staff with sammies...
- Space have enough space to setup and leave 10+ ft to anybody that may come into the area, or ensure nobody comes into your area.

Equipment

- Radio mobile unit is nice but NOT necessary a base radio will work I've had my FTdx1200 in a tent in the winter worked fine.
- Power battery or solar or generator or commercial
- There are some restrictions if you operate on commercial power –
- Antenna anything from a hamstick on a tripod to a tribander on a tower, the idea is to be setup temporary. Sometimes a dipole hung from a tree branch is very effective.
- Tuner many mobile rigs need a tuner a way to beat this is with a resonant dipole 🕲
- Coax, cords, bungees, ty-raps, duct tape, wire ties, crimping tool, wire... you get the picture.

Support equipment

- Tent / canopy ya gots to protect yer equipment and yer head
- Consider a tent if working overnite bugs and moisture and temperature...
- Food whether its sammies or a grill, or pizza delivery energy is not just for the radio
- Sunscreen especially for the folks that haven't been out much 🕲
- Drink water is good, keep hydrated, don't overdo the sugary or alcoholic drinks
- Table someplace to put the snacks Oh, and the radio 🕲
- Chair this is important hopefully you will be operating for a few hours, and a good chair is sometimes worth as much as a good antenna.

Signage

• If you allow others into your operating area you need to keep them away from the operator, the antenna, and each other

Schedule & Band plan

- When are you operating? When are you sleeping?
- What band are you concentrating on Antenna will determine a lot of this
- General or Extra frequencies (or Tech UHF / VHF)? Keep track to stay within your license privileges.
- Sitting on a frequency or skimming? Different strategies at different times...

Read the rules – I know, somebody else always does this, and tells us what our class, etc is – now it's up to you. I'm hoping to be operating as 1E (gotta get another battery (3))





Skywarn—Amateur radio and the weather

Skywarn is a part of the National Weather Service (NWS)-it is a network of observers that report weather conditions in real time. Since many Hams have weather monitoring equipment, a means of quick direct communication, and a level of technical knowledge. Hams are a good fit with Skywarn. Some training is required, and very little is online, so currently classes are on hold for the Covid-19 time period. Our region does not have a local NWS contact-Albany and Boston are listed on the webpage.

Your contest exchange will be a signal report (59), County and State. This is the exchange for all New England stations. Non-NE stations will exchange a signal report (59), State/Province/Dx.


HCRA is an award presenter (Massachusetts - single operator - low power - Hampden County). This is something the club has done for several years, and it's not always a club member that wins.

Netlogger Basics: So, we can do an entire ZB on setting up Netlogger, but we won't.

This is the main screen—note the top tabs—start with setup, this is where you personalize things. Then you select net—this lists the current nets, frequencies, etc. Select the net you want (you will be in lurking status until you check in) and monitor net (bottom of the net window). You will not show up until you are checked in—open the View Monitors window and you will see yourself as lurking. There is also a AIM window—you can sometimes check in via Almost Instant Messenger, you can also message others on the net, like a chat window in Zoom.

Join us on Monday (10M net) or Thursday (2M net) and try it out.
