November Meeting: This month we have a virtual visit about The Amazing Transatlantic Feat of 1901 by Marconi – K1ZM, Jeff via Skype as he is in PEI. He will tell us about the first wireless radio transmission between North America and Europe. Like the beginnings of all technological advances, the start was inefficient and primitive compared to what we have now. 4 tall antennas and 75 kilowatts to make that first transmission. 75 kilowatts—kinda puts that footwarmer (amplifier) you have under your desk in the shack look pretty small!!

### Awards



Membership is just \$49/yr, less than a weekly coffee at Dunks...






