10 Meters is lighting up with activity! If you haven't been on 10m lately, you are missing out. Stations from all over the globe can be heard easily and worked with not much power. I recently heard a station in Bermuda coming in strong and decided to experiment. Instead of turning on my amp, I turned the power down to 5 watts. Three calls later, he was in my log and said he was amazed at how strong my 5 watt signal was on SSB. 10 meters being active adds a lot of excitement to our amazing hobby. I hope you'll get on the air and find out for yourself!

Every year for the second weekend in December, the ARRL holds the annual 10-meter contest. This is BOTH a SSB and CW contest. It starts at 7 pm on Friday the 9th at 7:00 pm local time and runs through 7:00 pm Sunday night.

Here are the rules: <u>http://www.arrl.org/10-meter</u>

This is a very enjoyable contest. It's a great way for new hams to be introduced to contesting and for experienced hams to have fun. It's a great contest to have friends over and get on the air together, have great conversations and have fun. I've done that for many years in the past and it's always enjoyable.

Your scores can be submitted for the club. Make sure to enter your club as the: *Hampden County Radio Association* - spell it out. Do not put in HCRA. This helps the HCRA compete with other clubs.

Make sure to submit your log online within 7 days after the contest ends. I usually submit my log the very next day.

The report is super simple. RS(T) and State. 59 (or 599 on CW) MA is the report if you are in Massachusetts. It's that easy.

I use N3FJP logger (<u>http://n3fjp.com/10meter.html</u>). But you can use N1MM (<u>https://n1mmwp.hamdocs.com</u>) or anything you would like to log with. Using a computer log has it figuring your score automatically. Scoring made easy.

I hope to hear you on the air and work you too!

<u>I</u> am sitting at my desk, surrounded by my radios and 3 screens (soon a 4th to be added) attached to 2 computers. One is dedicated to only my ham radio and the others to work and everything else. The ham radio screen has the spot collector module from DX Lab Suite logging program running. The spot collector compares what comes in, to what my log has and highlights in red needed DX entities. I've already worked a few DX on CW this morning. I'm just sort of watching it between my work today and then trying to work an occasional station.

I don't work just the needed DX. I also work anyone as I like to rag chew. Whether it be on HF or VHF/UHF. Ham radio is all about the gift of gab. We all like to talk and some fascinating conversations can be had.

<u>**This year I have gotten on D-Star</u>**. I still have my DMR HT and hotspot, but haven't been on DMR in ages. I reprogrammed my ZumSpot radio hotspot for D-star in the house and use either my Icom IC-705 or more likely my Icom ID-52A HT.</u>

I have my HT set on 100 mw of power which is perfect for my hotspot. Anywhere in my yard, I can get into the hotspot and connect to a reflector. I find myself on REF069C or Reflector 69 C which is the CT D-Star Network talking to local friends.

When camping, I hotspot my phone and have talked to the home reflector with the same 100 mw from western NY and northern VT. In fact, from Northern Vermont, 200 miles north of here, Faye and I were sitting in our campsite, talking through REF69C through the hotspot to my friend Bill, W5JAZ who was outside Dallas Texas or I try to catch my buddy Bob, NO4MM (ex: KA1AHR) through the Walt Disney World area reflector. It's pretty cool and lots of fun.

I've since replaced my 20 year old Yaesu vhf/uhf, in my truck, which wasn't working right with a Icom ID-5100 vhf/uhf/D-star mobile. I commonly use the W1KK 440 machine in Agawam and when out of range of that machine. I hotspot my phone and use my portable radio hotspot and connect to REF69C or wherever I would like to listen or talk. If I have phone service, I can stay connected. You could drive across the country and have one long conversation with your friends back home.

I've had some interesting conversations with hams in South Korea, Sydney Australia, England and other "DX" places as well as stateside. D-star has become another aspect of ham radio that I am enjoying.

You can start here: <u>https://youtu.be/ZMMt55Dtp5Q</u> to learn more about D-star. Maybe I'll hear you on. I very often have my ID-52A on my desk where I listen while I work or sit outside when it's warm.

By now, the Steaming Tender has the club's reservations for the Holiday Party. We had a superb time last year and expect to repeat that this year too. I hope to see you there!

I am writing this the day after Veterans Day. First of all, thank you to all of you who served. Our country wouldn't have the freedoms we have if it wasn't for the men and women of our armed forces.

Second of all, what season are we really in??? The start of November has gone from freezing temperatures into the 70's and back again. Last night it was in the upper 60's overnight. Later this week we will struggle to get out of the 40's.

All the crazy weather makes it even more important to always be

ready for any weather event. The increase in natural gas, home heating oil, and electricity make it even more important to be as efficient as possible with energy use. I am taking some actions now that will save money in the long run but also prepare me for supply issues, either weather-related or man-made.

I showed my butane stove last month. As of this morning, I am using it exclusively to prepare meals so I don't have to use my gas stove. I will be tracking butane usage and let you know next month if it works out. I will also be using the coffee percolator I had in the picture instead of my electric percolator. In addition, I will no longer use my dishwasher and do the dishes by hand. Hoping to cut back some on the electric and gas bills this way. I won't be able to tell how much I save because my utilities are part of my rent but I rent from family so it's the least I can do. These actions will also give me lots of practice if there are energy issues this winter.

What does all this and the words that follow have to do with EmComm? If you don't have reliable food, water, shelter, and sanitation you cannot operate effectively or for very long. EmComm is more than having a battery, solar, or generator-powered radios. It is, sometimes, about operating in challenging times when others have gone off the air due to a lack of preparation or underestimating their reserves. One more important item for EmComm is coffee, lots of coffee.

When the grid goes down in the summer you have to scramble to keep food safe in your refrigerator and freezer. In the winter, if there is enough snow on the ground, you can dig a hole in the snow, line it with plastic bags and bury your food in the snow. Another choice is to take zip-locked bags of snow and pack your freezer and fridge with them to keep the food cold. If it looks like a short outage I go with the 2nd choice and use all the food in my fridge first, then use the food in the freezer next. After that I go into my emergency pantry, you do have an emergency pantry, right?

Snow is also good for flushing toilets. If a city water pipe bursts due to deep frost or just age, you can melt snow to flush the toilets. Just be sure to start with just a few handfuls of snow in the pot and gradually add more snow to the water. If you try to melt a whole pot of snow at once it takes forever. Don't drink melted snow unless you have a water filter rated for stream and lake water. They are inexpensive and should remove the contaminants present in snow. The LifeStraws style filter available in outdoor stores and online are inexpensive and work well.

If you have rechargeable AA, AAA, C, or D batteries, you should top them off per the manufactures instructions. Some of the older ones self-discharge and can get low enough to no longer be usable. The newer ones should specify "low self-discharge" but still need to be topped off after a while in storage. These are great for flashlights, area lights, headband style lights as well as any HT you may have with an adapter for using rechargeable batteries. I finally reorganized my battery drawer in the shack. I now have a go-box with all my AA and AAA batteries as well as an AC charger and a DC charger. I can charge them all from my shack batteries which are solar-charged.

More next month, I hope to see you all at the HCRA Holiday Party on Dec 5th.

One final note. The ARES nets monthly breakfast was held at D&Js Hash House this morning. All four net controls were present and half the spouses. I have to say I am blessed with a fantastic crew and look forward to us getting even better. I am temporarily suspending the search for new net controls. The ones I have are doing a great job. INTERVIEW OF RICH GUERRERA, KB1FGC

Creator of a Special Event Honoring Ham Radio Mentors by Bill, W1FMX

- D

Ham Radio is a hobby that usually requires a new licensee to have a mentor to show him or her what kind of equipment to get and how to operate it. This past October (Oct. 20-23, 2022), Rich Guerrera (KB1FGC) spearheaded a special event with the call sign, "W1E/ELMER", to acknowledge and thank Hams who help new Hams get started in the hobby. Here is an interview of Rich describing the event.

1. How did you get the idea for an Elmer Appreciation Day?

I read an online article of QST in a 2011 issue. A Ham wrote about how he hosted his own special event. I was surprised that a single Ham could host one as I thought only clubs could apply. So, I decided to try doing a special event, too.

My first event was in honor of my dad who owned a trucking business and was on the board of D.O.T

(Department of Transportation) in Connecticut. I enjoyed running that event so much that I wanted to add another. I had never heard of any event honoring Hams, so I came up with the special Elmer event. I have benefited so much from helping so many other Hams. This seemed like a good idea and it was a way of saying thanks.

2.What does being a Mentor mean to you?

I think it means passing on knowledge to other Hams who need a hand. It is also about making new Hams feel at ease and working with them. In my experience, I have been treated with respect regardless of my technical ability. I find that courtesy is common among Hams, which surprised me.

3. Talk about a Ham Radio Elmer you knew. How did he help?

The first Ham that comes to mind is Steve (N1AOB). He lives in a town over from me. In 2000, I got licensed and was in the process of getting my code going. I found the Waterbury Amateur Radio club online and saw Steve's name as one of the contacts. I decided to give him a call and ask a few questions about how to get started in the hobby. He told me he would come over and lend a hand with my set-up. He also invited me over to his QTH to check out his station. I was pretty taken by that as he didn't know me, but he was willing to spend time with a stranger and help me out.

4. What did you have to do to get the event going?

It took a little bit of work. First, I had to apply for the special call sign (W1E) and set the dates. The call sign can be applied for at several websites, one of them belonging to the ARRL. Also, I wanted to get the event published in QST, so notification to the magazine needed to be done 4 months prior to the event.

Then, I put the word out on QRZ to try to get some other Hams to join and also asked some guys who had helped me with Ham-related matters if they were interested. Lastly, I had to get a webpage up and also create a simple certificate that those who wanted confirmation could download. One Ham, Glenn (WG3F), when asked to be an operator for the event, not only accepted but offered to make the special event certificate. The call letters and Elmer, W1E/Elmer, were also listed on QRZ.com.

5. How many participated (that is how many other Hams worked the Event)?

Originally, 8 had volunteered, but only 6 participated. So far, the operators who did it this year still want to do it again next year, plus one more fellow said he wants to participate next time. At the moment, I must say that it's not easy to get operators. I think most Hams expect an event like this to be organized by a club. So, just one Ham writing on the internet asking if Hams want to join in working a special event doesn't have the impact a club can have. But I was happy with what I got.

6. How many contacts were made over the 4 days by all of the operators?

The total for all operators was just over 300 QSO's. Next year, I may work a little faster. It was fun though! One point I did make was that it did not matter how many contacts an operator worked, just that each operator should have fun - so, really any operating technique works.

7. Did you or any of the other operators hear any good stories during the Elmer Event that should be shared in the article?

One fellow did make a point about how he really appreciated the event and how his Elmer had a positive impact on him when he started out. Another person was Elmering a new Ham but laughed because the other guy was more technically adept than he was, but still needed some education on operating techniques.

Many did seem to appreciate what the event stood for and wished me luck. A surprising number of people we spoke with told stories about how their mentors helped them.

One Ham said he got his license as a teenager and his Elmer was a neighbor who had a plumbing business. If the teen called him with a problem, sometimes the older Ham would actually stop work and come over to keep the young guy from "sticking a screwdriver in the wrong place."

8. Any new ideas for things you would like to add to the next Elmer Event?

I was pleased that the event went very well. The only thing I would change is to have it last just 3 days instead of 4, and maybe work contacts a little bit faster. If I can get more Hams to operate that would be great, if not that's okay, too.

One thing though is that, if Hams from other call area become operators for the event, we'll need to get special event callsigns with those call area numbers, too.

This months "Show Your Shack" features long time former HCRA member from the past. Below is a photo of his original shack from back in 1964 when Gent was a Novice. Also Gent has provided his current shack so you can see exactly how much things have changed over the last 59 years!

I'm sure many long time HCRA members will remember Gent, his shack, and of coarse his callsign! Continue reading for details on Gent's original Novice station from back in 1964 and what it looks like today!

Gents first Novice Station in 1964 as WN1CQF. Heath HR20 receiver assembled from a kit with a homebrew power supply. Eico 723 CW transmitter kit, purchased from Springfield Radio, on Dwight St, in Springfield, Mass for \$12.

The box was water damaged with possible missing parts. The only thing missing was the power cord and all components were fine. Deal of the century for a high school kid whose only income was skipping lunch and hoarding my lunch money. Home-brew field strength and SWR meters. 40 meter dipole. No room for an 80 meter dipole and I didn't operate on 15 meters due to TVI. J38 key completed the setup. My brother gave me the test equipment.

This Month's Featured Shack is that of Gent, WA1CQF



Above Photo: Gent, WA1CQF's Current Day Shack. What a Difference Between 1964 and Today.

At that time, novices were limited to crystal control and an input power of 75 watts. Lots of novices on the air and 40 meters was very active. Anything west of the Mississippi was considered DX!

I was originally licensed in 1964 as a novice, homebrew construction has always been my favorite part of the hobby. After upgrading in 1965, I built a VFO and 811A 200 watt amplifier featured in the ARRL 1963 handbook, Since then, I've been hooked on amplifiers.

The above photo shows not only my Elecraft K3 but also my latest amplifier. A pair of 3-500 tubes for the bands 80,40,20,15 and 10 meters with filament and high voltage soft start, tuned inputs, low voltage keying, and vernier operation of the tune and load capacitors.

Also, in the above photo to the right of the amp is an Arduino based enhancement I incorporated into my CD-45 rotator. It allows for a potentiometer to be set to a desired direction. By activating a momentary switch, the rotator will start an automatic sequence to rotate the antenna to that desired position. 73,
