FROM THE SHACK

A number of years ago participation in Show and Tell was so low and the submission of projects so bad. (do you remember the foam cw paddles?) the board nearly elected to cancel Show and Tell for the future. There was a lively discussion and it was decided to give it one more year to see if it made a comeback. Boy did it ever and has stayed as one of the most popular meetings thru out the year since.

I'm hoping that the 2019 Show and Tell, which is the next meeting on April 5th will be interesting and fun as well. S & T is a chance to show off that ham or electronic related project that you've built. Any project is eligible. Last year we had some superb projects consisting of Ubitx transceivers, mobile go box, power converters, antennas and interfaces and so much more. This year we do hope you will bring your project and spend 5 minutes telling the group about it. No project is too small and if it's too big, take some pics and bring them with.

For each participant, we ask that you make a sign on a piece of paper saying what the project is, what it does and add your name and call. Each participant will get 5 to a max of 10 minutes to explain their project. Juergen, NV1Q is the supreme project judge and

has a stable of 4 additional judges. Participants can win one of 4 prizes in different categories including a new ham/original idea category. This is new and one we wish we had last year. What are the prizes? Come to the meeting and you'll see.

If you're not bringing a project, S & T is a great way to learn about what your ham friends have been building in the past year. Usually there is some very cool stuff to view and it might give you ideas to build something yourself or get over the hump of wanting to build but never have. It certainly motivated me. I will be bringing something I assembled. I know we had 2 winners of the Ubitx transceivers at Field Day. Hopefully we'll see one or both in their built form (KD1RV? & K1VOI?).

For many years I resisted chasing DX. I watched a number of HCRA members go at it comparing catches, QSL cards, what bands and what modes they worked them on. I was happy just rag chewing. But then something changed. I got curious how many countries (or entities) I had worked. I uploaded my log to ClubLog a few years ago to the HCRA group. Suddenly I could see how my contacts for that year stacked up against everyone else. Suddenly I was interested. Suddenly I started paying much more attention to the rarer DX stations and making an attempt to work them.

Once you're a member of ClubLog adding new contacts to your records there are easy peasy with DX Labs DX Keeper logging program. Set up your variables (user name and password) and click one button occasionally. Give ClubLog 24 hours to catch up to your entries and it updates. Then revisit the HCRA page and see how you compare to everyone else. You can change sort options to see all sorts of information. What is your position? I seem to be stuck in #4 or #5 position each year, but am having fun anyways. I probably check ClubLog too often!

But it's FUN. If you are on HF and making any contacts and using a computerized logger, upload your log to www.clublog.com and join the fun (it's free). You can be on digital, ssb or cw, in any portion of the band. You don't need to be an extra to participate. DX Contests are a fast way to make contacts earning a new country. But making QSO's on your schedule works too. Give it a try. I hope to see some new calls up there!

HCRA Presidents Message: March 2019 (cont'd)

Saturday, April 27th is our Fox Hunting Share the Knowledge session. We will be doing 3 main things. First is building a tape measure yagi beam. NT1K is taking this on again and the cost is \$20 for this portion to cover costs of parts. Second is the assembly of the attenuator. The costs cover the box it will be built in, connectors, attenuator, everything. This is also \$20. If you are not comfortable with building and soldering, we'll have experienced hams there to help and teach you. Then when all done, we will have a mini fox hunt in the parking lot. Here we'll train you on use of the antenna and what you need to do to track down the fox. Somewhere in the middle we get pizza for lunch and ask for \$5pp to cover that. More as time gets closer. It will be a fun day. Deadline to sign up is April 10th.

As June slowly approaches, a few things to think about.

Join the board and help make decisions that affect your club, elections in June. One long standing member, Dave, WM1B is leaving the board after many years. We need someone to take his place as Vice President. Or if you want another position, please let a board member know.

A workshop to build a tape measure antenna and an attenuator to use in Fox Hunting.

The date will be **Saturday April 27th** in the same room as where the meetings are held. The Holyoke Hospital Auxiliary room, **10:00 AM to 4:00 PM**. If you've never soldered before, there will be enough helpers there to teach you to solder and help you assemble the attenuator. Help will be there if needed for the antenna too. Please bring a 9 volt battery.

This will be a fun session and get everyone ready for fox hunting with the HCRA. You need to bring a HT or battery operated 2m radio (817, etc).

Signup by April 10 so we can make sure we have the supplies for class.

ARRL Education:

Lifelong Learning Initiative—The ARRL is funding (almost \$.5M) an upgrade / change to the learning environment. Tentatively set to roll out this fall, it will start with online opportunities for newer hams, and youth education. Talk about a way to grow the field of amateur radio. Online learning is very appropriate, especially with the new mentoring initiative.

ARRL Advocacy:

The ARRL is our lobbyist / advocate with both Congress and the FCC. There are a couple of big items that have been in discussion for a while. One of them (Radio Parity Act) has been withdrawn, for review and re-appraisal. The other is some proposed changes to the amateur frequency and mode privileges.

The FCC has opened the comment period for some changes that will give Technician licensed amateurs SSB priviliges in some of the HF bands. This has been talked about amongst hams for a while. Many believe it will help grow amateur radio. So, read about the changes, and send in your comments.




