Many years ago, I received my 10-10 number (<https://www.ten-ten.org/>). Participating in the 10-10 contest is always a lot of fun, when the band is open. I'm hoping it may be this year. You can earn your 10-10 number by working 10 ten-ten members on 10 meters and submitting the log of those ten people worked. My number is in the low 30,000's. I believe the latest numbers in the 80,000's. You can work the contest and collect numbers and submit them at that time too. It's another way to promote activity on 10 meters. I hope to work you.

My 160m antenna has only been up for a few years but is working great and I'm having fun on this band. I have around 330 feet of wire up in the trees. It's in a "L" shape with 2 legs angled off from it. It's another band to have some fun on.

A number of months ago, a non-ham friend contacted me and joined us during one of our meetings. He explained how he is chasing (kind of DF'ing) weather balloons. The next thing I knew WA1OJN had gotten into it and after chatting with Bob, I became curious. So I picked up a SDR dongle with the hopes of taking it and my travel laptop portable along with an appropriate antenna.

Well, I haven't made it to the chase stage yet as I'm learning the SDR receive program first by tinkering with it on my work laptop and hooked up to my scanner antenna.

But the tracking of weather balloons is interesting and Marcel; AA1WH's balloon project will perk my interest more too. The weather balloons are launched twice a day from many locations. One of the things that I presented at the cabinet meeting was a discussion on doing a booth at the Big E. Sponsored by the clubs in New England. I proposed a booth for the 2022 Big E giving us 21 months to prepare.

The idea was received very well and with lots of excitement. So much so, that a group has been created and we're moving forward with the project. The HCRA is going to be very involved as we are the local club. For now, I will leave you with this teaser and let you know I'm working on moving it forward. I have the assistance of two other immediate hams in MA to get things started. You can pencil in the Big E in your electronic calendars for Sept 17 through Oct 3rd, 2022. We've got some great ideas on how to create a booth with sponsors and a way to present to the public. More information as the project moves forward. Start thinking about it now and how you can contribute.

Fox Hunting has been one of my favorite things to do in ham radio since 1979! I hunted for over 10 years and at one time was out 3 times a week. It was a blast back then. Then family arrived and fox hunting slowly went to the side. It was always in my mind, but that's about all.

For a number of years I've done the New Years day fox hunt down in CT. I've usually done terrible coming in last or quitting in aggravated disgust at not being able to find the fox. Then two years ago, WA1OJN, WM1B and myself teamed up and we came in 6 out of 12 hunters. Pretty good and I was pretty happy about that. The following year I was back to last place but not giving up. Then the foxboxes started being hidden and the fun began.

The foxboxes gave Faye and I a reason to pack a box lunch and get out of the house after being stuck working in all week due to Covid. We hunted every weekend until the warm weather arrived. As you know, the HCRA got into the fun and we have a fox box too and soon a 2nd one.

It doesn't take much to hunt. All you need in an HT, basic antenna and attenuator and maybe a map or access to google maps on your phone. Now that winter is here again, the CT foxboxes are being hidden again and so is the HCRA fox box. Faye and I have plans to go out hunting this weekend down in CT. Southern CT has some clubs hiding their own fox boxes too as well as eastern MA. But you don't have to go that far, you can hunt right here in the Pioneer Valley and northern CT.

BALLOONS!!

While the Covid virus has quashed our hopes to conduct in person club meetings and activities, other ham radio pursuits are unaffected such as learning new modes or skills, nets, contests and my pico balloon project. Here is what's going on with the balloon.

Trackers (APRS and APRS/WSPR) are in very short supply worldwide. I'm not certain as to why but I have noticed increased interest in ballooning and there are usually a number of balloons in flight on any given day. However, through my connection with WB8ELK, Bill Brown through the Amateur Radio Roundtable podcast, I was able to source the tracker I hoped to use. Bill has been very helpful and freely shares his knowledge and experience with pico and high altitude balloons (HAB). As I write this, I am awaiting the arrival of an APRS/WSPR tracker with the solar panels and antennas attached. Bill advised that it is built and programmed but awaiting a day or 2 of sunshine so he can be certain all is operating correctly. As an added benefit; he programmed the tracker with my call sign. I have 2 – 36 inch party balloons so all I need to add is some hydrogen and we will be flying!



But I must slow down a bit here as I want to thoroughly test the equipment before launching it with hope of crossing the Atlantic! Once I have the tracker, I intend to set it outside where it can collect sunlight for as long as possible for two or more weeks to assure all systems are functioning. As I mentioned in the last article, the tracker will have a gps, voltage, pressure and temperature sensors in addition to 2 meter APRS and 20 meter WSPR transmitters. It carries full size dipole antennas of thin bronze wire (think guitar strings) and is capable of being heard in excess of 200 miles by APRS and 5000 miles on WSPR. All from just a few milliwatts of power and well under 1 ounce in weight!

Anyone who would like to track and/or report the balloon, even during test phase can do so by using your APRS station. (something I don't have) Also, you should try tracking on 20 meter WSPR as this will enable you to follow progress from anywhere within 5000 miles subject to propagation conditions. If you are not familiar with WSPR, you can download WSJT-X software from the web, it's free and pretty much the gold standard for weak signal, EME (moon bounce), FT-4, FT-8 etc. You need a 20 meter rig and if yours doesn't have a built in soundcard, you will need something like Signalink USB and of course, a computer. You connect your computer to the radio soundcard (or Signalink) and the soundcard to the radio. The necessary equipment and connecting wires are available for very reasonable cost from the usual high quality vendors like DXE, HRO, Main Trading, etc. Their sales people can assure that you have the correct wires the first time, enabling you to receive and transmit without undue frustration. While it does take a little time to go through all the settings (I did it in less than a day and I'm not a computer savvy person) it's well documented and then you are on the air. You should note that if you are hesitant to take this on, there are many of us in the club who do digital modes and will be glad to help you set your station up. It really is not difficult and you can use many older rigs too.

BALLOONS CONT'D

My digital station is my old Yaesu FT 897d which is connected to an end fed half wave 10 thru 40 meter multiband antenna set up in an inverted L. At maximum height, it is about 33 feet above ground level. With this modest station, I have worked the world on digital modes and tracked pico balloons more than 5000 miles away! Once you have WSPR set up receiving and/or sending signals, you can report them to WSPRnet.org. This is also a free site and collects and displays reception reports from all over the world in real time. There is also a database of millions of old reports accessible to anyone to study their station performance, propagation or whatever. Uploading reports is simple, just set the toggle in WSJT-X to "Upload Reports" and the software does the rest. I often run a WSPR beacon on 20, 40 or 80 meters for hours or even days just to check propagation. My 5 watt signal into that multiband end fed has been received in New Zealand, Australia, Hawaii, Japan and all over Europe, North and South America. It's quite fun to see how far such a small station can reach out successfully!

In a future article, I will detail the next steps after this initial flight in my pico balloon adventure. In order to reduce weight to an absolute minimum, I intend to make my own solar panels when I move up to a large, 13 foot balloon. I just received 100 polycrystalline solar cells. These are .75 inches by 2 inches and less than 1/100 inch thick. They are made on extremely thin glass and are fragile. Did I mention they are fragile? I intend to mount the cells on Styrofoam once they are soldered together. Each cell produces .54 volts of direct current. This will challenge my soldering skills given my cataracts and arthritic hands. Work will be done under a magnifying light or microscope if the magnifier is not sufficient. I hope to source a very small transmitter but the one I'm looking at is only available as a kit. This is where I hope to partner with the high school hams at Pathfinder Regional and get those young hands and eyes to assemble the transmitter. But before that, I will have a report back on the shakedown of the WB8ELK transmitter and perhaps even the launch of the AA1WH pico balloon.

So, until next time, please watch for announcements on the HCRA FaceBook page and twitter feeds that my tracker is transmitting and either upload reports to WSPRnet.org or drop me and email with your report. Depending on USPS clearing up the backlog of mail remaining from the holidays, I'm fairly confident I should have the tracker out transmitting sometime in late January and certainly by early February. After the shakedown run, I will select a launch date. I'm looking toward late February or early March when days are getting longer so we get at least 6 hours of reports daily. Also, I will watch the weather here and over Europe/Africa and try to choose a launch window with minimum chance of encountering bad weather. It's not unheard of to achieve a circumnavigation with this setup but chances are against it. My goal is to get across the Atlantic and well into Europe or Africa. A bonus would be to make it all the way to Asia.

Until next time, stay safe, socially distance, wash your hands and please track my balloon!

Time

(with apologies to Morris Day for being serious, and having no rhythm)

Do you ever wonder why time is given in different formats? We in Western Mass are in Eastern Standard Time (EST) although that is changed for part of the year due to Daylight Savings Time (DST) which puts EST 1 hour earlier. But we, as hams, communicate with other hams worldwide, so we have a standard time to log our contacts, set contest times, etc.

That is UTC – Coordinated Universal Time. The acronym was agreed upon by various scientific agencies when adopted in the 60's. Historically, it was formerly known as Greenwich Mean Time, used when Great Britain ruled the seas worldwide, and was used for navigation purposes. It is basically the time at the Royal Observatory in Greenwich England. The Prime Meridian (0° longitude) runs through Greenwich England. We are approximately 72° longitude. UTC uses a 24 hour clock, no AM or PM.

Normally, we will note or use time as our own local time zone, with AM or PM denoting before or after noon. Another format is military time – in the military, a 24 hour clock is used, and no colon.

So, 7:00 AM EST is 02:00 UST and 0200 military time. 7:00 PM EST is 14:00 UST and 1900 military time. The relation changes between local time and UTC during DST – subtract an hour. 7:00 PM DST here is 15:00 UST.

Confused? I have used all 3 time reporting formats frequently. I grew up around boats, and my Dad did celestial navigation so I grew up with Greenwich Mean Time (GMT), now UTC. In the Navy, we used Zulu time (UTC in the military format) when we were underway. Now as a ham, I am using UTC for my log, and to keep up with start time of on-air events.

Since I use all 3 time reporting types, I tend to default to military time for day to day stuff and UTC for my logs and ham stuff. I don't use local time (AM/PM) that often. Drives others crazy, especially if they are not used to military or UTC.

So, who else uses UTC?

Pilots (commercial, military and civilian)

Navigators (sailors military and civilian)

Aerospace – the International Space Station, launch facilities, satellites

Space Observatories

Ham Radio Operators (our representative for time updates, and protocols is the International Amateur Radio Union)

So, UTC is truly worldwide, and used by all manner of people where knowledge of standard timing is necessary. Your log should be in UTC (online logging systems are automatically setup that way, with the time set by the internet). Take a look at the Wikipedia entry on it (https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Coordinated_Universal_Time) - it has much more information.

I will try to use time formats consistently in Zero Beat. UTC for radio applications (contests, etc) and local time for local events (meetings, events).

ARRL STUFF

Things are happening in the world of Amateur Radio. ARRL is our advocate for Government, education and organization. I hope everyone that is a member of HCRA is also a member of ARRL.

ARRL comments in Orbital Debris Mitigation Proceeding

While this sounds pretty dry, it could be an important topic for those that are involved with amateur satellites. There are many of the small “cubesats” up in space, setup by hams for communication. The FCC is proposing rather strict rules for low orbit satellites that would add liability and propulsion requirements to all satellites above 400 km. This would be appropriate for the larger commercial satellites, but the small amateur cubesats would have to meet these same requirements, thus pricing amateur satellites out of space.

The ARRL is proposing some exemptions for amateur satellites to allow us to continue with this important and useful part of ham radio. Due to the requirement that an amateur satellite licensee is an individual, the liability requirement would be an unacceptable burden. The propulsion / maneuverability requirement would price amateur satellites pretty much out of existence.

This is one of the ways that ARRL looks out for all aspects of amateur radio—by keeping track of proposed rule changes, and the potential effect on all hams. Support the ARRL and their efforts on our behalf.

ARRL Western Mass Section

The section has another HCRA member added to the staff— [Mike DeChristopher N1TA](#) has become our new Assistant Section Manager. Mike has a background in contesting and once had the position as ARRL contest manager in Newington. WMA Section still has openings in the organization—contact Ray KB1LRL if you are interested in joining a growing ARRL presence in WMA.

Larry W1AST has proposed, and is coordinating a grand idea for the Big E 2022. This will be a BIG endeavor, with the potential to really highlight the many facets of ham radio to the 1.6 million plus visitors. Long time to plan, long time to join in. More will be coming from the ARRL, and Larry W1AST as things develop.



Near Fest has been cancelled. Sadly, many of the events for ham radio will not be happening for another year. The WMA page keeps things updated on the bigger events as the news gets out.
