Have you visited the HCRA website lately? We've made a number of changes and it is worth stopping more often by to take a look. Sure, some things are the same, but many are different and new.

Find out about past operating Events for the 10m Contest and Field Day. At Membership you can renew your dues online, read the club bylaws, print a membership application and see the list of current members. Are you still on the list? If you are, you are paid up through next September. If you are not, then print the application and send it in.

We have a new website category: Member Perks. I've had people ask me "Why Should I Join"? Your \$15 a year covers club expenses such as donations to the hospital for use of the room for the year, the same to the town of Agawam for the Field Day site, supplies for Field Day maintenance of equipment and other expenses. And now even more bang for your \$15 membership. Currently we have three member perks.

1. The club now offers to pool outgoing DX QSL cards with other club members through the ARRL's outgoing QSL Service.. You must be an ARRL member to use this and it will save you at least \$7 per outgoing bundle of QSL cards. Learn more here: <a href="http://www.hcra.org/dx-qsl/">http://www.hcra.org/dx-qsl/</a>

2. The club now officially offers help to all members that may need it. This help has always been there, but now it's more known within the membership and more private. Ask your question online and it gets emailed to Bob, K1YO who will then decide who is the best person to answer that question (it may be Bob himself). This service has only been up a short while and has already been put to use. No question is too simple. Ask away on any ham radio subject and you will get an email answer and someone to talk with further about the subject. 3. For a number of years, the club has had a listing in Club Log for HCRA club members. If you chase DX, whether a newbie just starting or an experienced DXer, club log is a great resource for you and a fun way to track your effort and see what your friends are doing too. Taken from the ClubLog about page: Club Log is a web based application that analyzes log files from radio amateurs all over the world. Using the logs, Club Log offers you a wise range of reports for your own benefit, and identifies large scale trends from the sum of all databases.

If you participate (it's free) in Club Log, make an account, log in and upload your computer log. Take a look at what the other members are doing. Click DXCC Leagues and then in the drop down box, filter by club and choose HCRA. Then click on Generate DXCC League. If you just uploaded your log, it may take a day to get your data posted to the HCRA Club Log group. It is a lot of fun to see where I place within the club members. Www.clublog.org

#### Silent Key

I got to learn a bit about the silent key tradition this last month. Unfortunately, the SK designation in QST is a larger and larger list each month. Last month, the man that encouraged me to enter amateur radio passed away. Our last conversation was me showing him some qsl cards, and telling him about a recent contact in Moscow at 25 watts. No longer able to speak easily, he held up 4 fingers, then 2 fingers. I smiled and told him I made the contact on 20 meters. He nodded and smiled. Looking back, I will treasure that bond of radio that we had. I think he got into amateur radio with his sons as a way to communicate while he was at sea (retired USCG). They all are cw proficient, something that is on my list to do.

The National Silent Key Archive (<a href="http://www.silentkeyhq.com/">http://www.silentkeyhq.com/</a>) is a way to leave more than a one line listing in QST. There is also a call sign lookup, and you may find info on someone that you knew there. You can create a page for someone you know, information is checked prior to publishing.


# Echolink—a repeater on your phone

So, something I learned about over the last couple of weeks—echolink is a software that will connect you, via the internet, to a repeater and allow you to operate. It's a bit like DMR in a few ways, but very different in others. This was shown to me by the folks at Nashua Area Radio Society during my Extra class. They actually have someone call in on their Sunday net from somewhere in the Caribbean... How cool is that??

I have installed the app on my phone— and made a contact on the Westerly RI repeater, with a ham in

Fairhaven MA that was also on echolink. When I open the app, I can choose from a long menu of repeaters to listen on, and if someone is there, make a contact, ragchew, participate in a net, etc. This can also be done the same way with your computer (I have it on my station laptop).

To activate yourself on echolink, you must be a licensed amateur. This is good for Technician level, as repeaters are generally within their operating privileges. After loading the app, you must send a copy of your license (the electronic one you downloaded from FCC) and echolink will send you an activation link. So, any technician level hams, that don't have a radio yet? This will get you onto a repeater!! For more info go to: http://www.echolink.org/



Another part of echolink is hosting a repeater. This is done on a computer, that is left on and connected to your 2M rig, and tuned to your local repeater. Our local (MTARA) repeater is not connected right now. This is a bit of a commitment, and would tie up equipment. But obviously other repeaters are there.

This is very different than DMR—the mobile radio / internet trend that some are into. Although many of the echolink repeaters are also DMR repeaters.

Whew, just when I grasp a facet of radio, two more show up to distract me.... This is a good hobby for an ADHD type like me;-)






