

Here are the final results, as printed in QST, for the 1991 VHF Sweepstakes. Many thanks to everyone who helped to put the HCRA over the top! Hampden County RA took third place in the country, in the Unlimited Club Category! Score was 542,228 points with 84 entries! This is a new club record for points and participation. You should feel proud!

W1NY took #2 multi-operator in the country, #1 in New England section, and in

Start in the North at FN33, move to FN41 in Connecticut/Rhode Island, then West to FN31, and finally back home to FN32, where the warm cocoa is kept next to the rig! 
The new Technicians will be on in force next January. What should we have for a goal? Break the 100 entries barrier? Go for one million points? Or just have a lot of fun!!!!!




