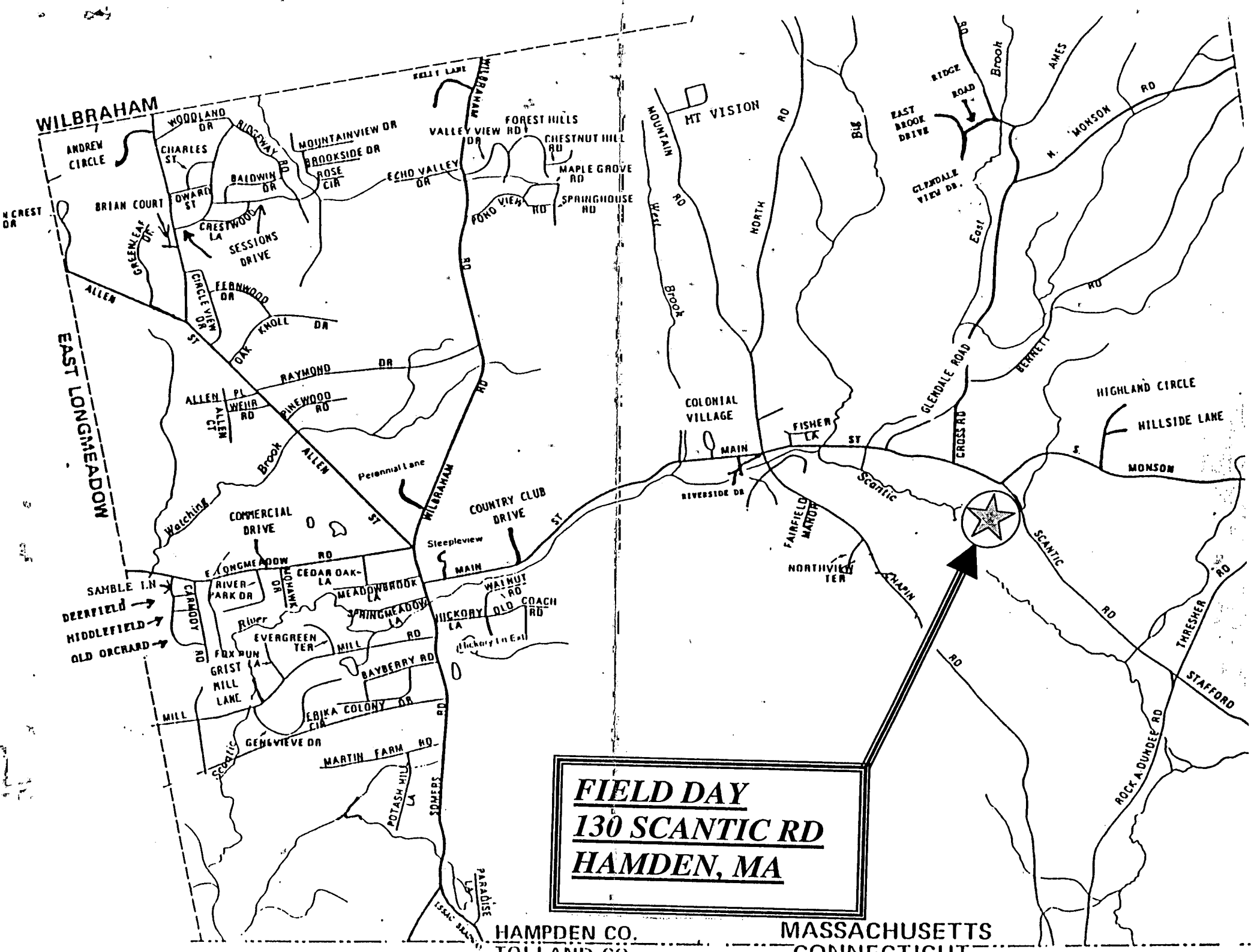

IN THE SPOTLIGHT

Meet Larry Smith K1ILZ

Larry's interest in amateur radio started in early 1957 when he was 31 years old. Larry does not remember what specific event might have sparked his interest. His background has been one of varied mechanical interests, including dabbling in antique radios. Somehow he got hold of an Amateur Radio Handbook and started studying for his Ham Ticket. He built an oscillator and with an old military key he started to learn the code. Although Pat, his XYL had no interest in Ham Radio at that time, she helped him with his code practice and in doing so she also became proficient with the code. Soon Larry had his ticket with the call K1ILZ. Larry's first rig was a very used Globe Trotter. After many repairs, winding of coils and purchasing some 80 meter crystals he hit the Novice bands. After upgrading to a General ticket, Larry went all out and purchased a used Johnson Viking 2. Between the 1958 and 1965 Larry achieved WAS and WAC on 10 meter AM and also enjoyed some rag chewing with some of the local hams.

Raising a family took top priority for Larry from 1965 to 1979 and in that time he neglected to renew his ticket. Don, W1UPH rekindled the spark for Larry when Don's Wilson handheld made contact with a mobile station in Greenfield from Larry's dining room. Larry had to start all over again at that time working up to a general ticket.

Since renewing Larry has been involved in numerous Ham activities including fox hunting, antenna experimenting, field day, and is active on the 160 meter band where he needs only 5 more state for CW WAS. Larry's most memorable contact is with VK7BC Tasmania breaking the pile up using his old Viking 2, 120 watts on CW. In 1995 Larry upgraded to Extra Class and also became a VE. Larry is a past president of the QVARC and is a member of QCWA and MTARA as well as a member and Director of HCRA. The HCRA is very honored to have Larry as one of its members.

EMERGENCY COMMUNICATIONS

As the summer season fast approaches, the thoughts of outdoor activities become reality. The awareness of threatening weather and the need to receive and report severe weather is important. Through National Weather, Taunton and Glen Fields, and the coordination effort by Eric Tuller N1QKO, many of our local amateurs attended the SKYWARN training sessions recently held in Greenfield and Palmer. This leads to the importance of fundamental operating practice during formal SKYWARN nets.

There are parameters for reporting severe weather and unless meeting minimum conditions, we should refrain from causing unnecessary chatter. Listen to Net Control for what the reporting criteria is and after checking in, if a need for a local report of your area, they will call. Local Emergency Managers and other Public Safety officials use the amateur radio net reports to make important decisions regarding safety of life and property. There are many non-amateurs that also tune in to the activated weather nets on the local repeaters.

Field Day is the weekend of June 27 - 28 and everyone is encouraged to participate, even if operating from a home station for an hour or so, with the thought of emergency communications operations, for if and when an emergency or disaster does happen. Being capable of maintaining reliable communications under the most adverse conditions is a real challenge when antennas are collapsed and electrical transmission power feed lines are like spider webs laying on the non-passable roads.

On Tuesday, May 19, the Galaxy 4 commercial satellite went berserk and upset the pager world, which indicates how much we rely on communications. If basic communications were lost due to natural disaster, terrorism, or even overload due to unusual events, technical failure, or high Sun Spot activity, how prepared are we to provide minimal emergency back-up for our community? When was the last time you originated or received a simple Happy Birthday greeting message? It could just as well be a request for medical supplies.

The Town of Southwick recently dedicated a new Town Hall and Emergency Operations Center after two years in construction. The EOC is equipped with a Rohn 55G tower supporting R.A.C.E.S. antennas for six, two meters and 440 MHz. Local amateurs under Southwick Emergency Management Agency R.A.C.E.S. are N1MOC, Keith Stromgren, N1YFH Tyler Moore, N1WHA Bernie Keefe, N1EVE Pauline Dunlap, and K1II Charlie Dunlap. The EOC is fortunate to have the permanent call KB1CDL to use for monthly drills, Field Day, and if needed, disaster communications.

On April 21-23, in conjunction with FEMA, and the Massachusetts Emergency Management Agency, the six New England States conducted a simulated Hurricane Disaster Exercise. Locally under the Massachusetts Emergency Management Agency Area III Radio Officers: Steve N1SR and Mike N1PSE, fifteen Western Massachusetts communities participated using R.A.C.E.S. operations to communicate from the local EOC to State Area III Headquarters in Belchertown and then to State Headquarters in Framingham (the Bunker). It is good news to see the amateur operators recognized and used.

A reminder to check into the ARES Nets on Sunday mornings on 3937 kHz at 0830 hrs, and 146.94 at 0845 hrs. and 146.91 at 0900 hrs. With fresh alkalines in one hand, a mag mount in the other, have a safe and enjoyable summer as you look skyward for that rotating wall cloud!

SEVERE WEATHER

REGISTRATION REQUIRED for Littletown class!

Here is the criteria that we will be looking for this summer when a SKYWARN is activated:

A GUIDE FOR REPORTING SEVERE WEATHER

1. Tornadoes / funnel clouds (be wary of look alike)
2. Wall clouds, especially if they are rotating
3. Any hail (be specific to size) DO NOT USE "MARBLE SIZE" TO DESCRIBE SIZE
4. Winds (40 mph or greater, estimated or recorded)
5. Damaging gusts (50 mph or greater)
6. Trees / power lines down. Large limbs down
7. Structural damage to buildings, windows broken.
8. Rainfall :
 - a. 1 inch or greater in 1 hour
 - b. 2 inches or greater storm total
9. Flash flooding:
 - a. Streams / rivers -also when nearing bankfull
 - b. Coastal/ street

PROCEDURES for calling into local net:

1. Identify yourself with your call and name
2. Be BRIEF in your observation. Include:
 - a. WHAT was observed
 - b. WHEN it was observed
 - c. WHERE it was observed

Include direction & distance from a known location

Some things to remember during a net :

When calling from your town. Please specify if in Ma. or Ct.
Don't relay reports that you here on repeaters in other coverage areas
Don't relay information from the WEATHER CHANNEL
Don't relay information you here on a scanner

WE WANT YOUR OBSERVATIONS!

After the storm has passed your location, **DO NOT** tell net control the storm has passed. Please stay off the air so that reports east of you can be taken. We don't need a summary of what has already happened. Please remember your safety during severe weather!
