November 2020 Presidents Message

Last month Matt, W1PY told us how to get started in contesting. The meeting was timed perfectly to coincide with the startup of the big ham radio contests in October. Sure, a lot of people say "I'm not a contester". I certainly said that for many years. I probably can still say it too. But I do enjoy getting on the air and working as man stations as possible. Sometimes it's DX, sometimes it's stateside or anyone on the air.

Around half a dozen years ago, I started getting more interested in chasing DX. After being a ham for 35 years, I was actually interested in earning my DXCC. The DX contests are a great way to work a bunch of DX stations easily. It's also a way to work some of those little islands that seem to be all over the place and each is considered its own entity. Many are activated just for contests. This is a perfect way for you to work them.

Originally, I started just working the ones I needed. Then gradually the fun of working many stations during Field Day in June, came back to me and I started working as many as I could work. I'll never be one of the big or mid-sized contest guns. My station is more of the tiny sized for contesting. But I enjoy participating and have fun. That's what it's all about.

I use N3FJP logging software for my contests that I participate in. Many use N1MM, there are others too. After the contest I make any corrections and submit the log. I also export it out and import it into my general log in DXKeeper which is part of the DX lab Suite. Then it gets uploaded to LOTW (Logbook Of The World - digital logbook confirmations).

From there I can print reports on what I have worked and what I need. I can also submit my DXCC or other achievements and request a certificate. There are many levels of each certificate, mine are mixed (phone & cw mainly, some digital) but you can get certificates for all one mode such as cw, phone, digital, each band and similar. It's all there for what you want. The certificates do look nice on the wall.

Contesting helped me earn those certificates. It helped me to work the stations that I always seem to miss or not being able to work. Maybe it's something for you to try? When I started, I just worked a few stations. The next year I had a goal. The following year my goal was to beat the prior year by x creating a new goal. Of course band conditions play into it. But it's always fun.

Even though it's early to mention, there is the ARRL 10m contest in December that the HCRA members participate in. That contest is one of a few where when you turn in your logs, you credit the Hampden County Radio Association (spelled out just like that) in your logging program. The goal is to get more members participating and getting the club a higher score each year. The ARRL 10m contest is both cw and ssb in the same contest. That's pretty unique as it's usually one mode with most other contests.

Please plan for the ARRL 10m contest in December on the second weekend. This year it's on the 12th and 13th. It run 48 hours from 0000z (7pm) Friday though 0000z Sunday. Here's the link to all the details: http://www.arrl.org/10-meter Mark your calendar to participate and I do hope to hear you on the air that weekend. There will be more details in the December ZeroBeat.

Things are happening in the world of Amateur Radio. ARRL is our advocate for Government, education and organization. I hope everyone that is a member of HCRA is also a member of ARRL.

An ARES resurgence in Western MA.

Over the last year, ARES has been getting retooled and reorganized in Western MA. There have been communication tests (one from our area to Franklin Cty to test non-repeater abilities that I participate in)

As you know, Bob K1YO is our WMA ARES Section Emergency Coordinator. Bob took this on to bring ARES back to national standards in our area, and things are moving forward. Right now, work on voice and digital communications is the focus. A section communications test is being planned for later this year that will test capabilities and provide practice in message handling during emergencies.

There are also training materials available on the web that cover ARES, Winlink, other digital modes and lots of topics. These are accessible for individuals and allow training without covid restrictions.

FCC proposal for fees (\$50) to Amateur Licenses.

OK, this is what ARRL is here for—to advocate for us. The FCC is proposing to institute a fee (\$50) for license applications (new, renewal AND vanity). I'm sure many of you have heard of this. But here is some info to make comments about this proposal:

- Read the ARRL guide to filing comments at http://www.arrl.org/arrl-guide-to-filing-comments-with-fcc This gives step by step direction for placing your comments in the federal register for the filing.
- Give the comment some thought. As the ARRL says in the guide—give the positive things that amateur radio provides—Emergency Communications, Education, Public Service (think FCARC radio support for races, Boston Marathon communications, etc), experimentation in communication equipment, ARISS. Should the grid or internet go down for any length of time, we will be a critical resource for public service.
- Write your comment carefully and respectfully. Try not to write it like my FB posts ;-) use your big words, check spelling and grammar. Act like you are writing something important.
- Follow the link in the guide to the comment page and submit the comment.
- While these fees are seemingly not large, they are a cost that amateur radio has been exempt from due to our public service. We should keep that.

Hampden County Radio Association, Inc – the bylaws.

So, did you know we are a Corporation? We fall under Massachusetts General Law, Chapter 180. Most charitable organizations that have dues, public service work, do fundraising are like this. Like everything else, it's mostly because of the money. It provides structure and limitations to prevent fraud. Not too complex. We are a non-profit – from Paul NF1G; We are (income)tax exempt under Chapter 501(c)3 of the Internal Revenue Code. We pay no income taxes for federal or state purposes but we do file an annual return for both. Contributions to HCRA are tax deductible to the extent nothing in value is received in return. Dues are not tax deductible, however. Sales taxes are a completed separate issue. We have received an exemption from Massachusetts Sales Tax which is what I filed for and we recently received exemption from Massachusetts.

As a Corporation, we have bylaws to provide an operating structure, define responsibilities, and guidance. Our bylaws are on the website under the membership tab: http://www.hcra.org/by-laws/. Its not a big document. Pretty straightforward. Read it, if you have any questions, contact a Board member, and we will do our best to answer you.

Speaking of Board Members – there are 9. All of us are listed in ZB each month, with our email. They are technically Director positions in the Corporation that is HCRA.

President – Larry W1AST - shall preside at all board and general meetings of the Corporation and at all other corporate functions.

Vice President – Marcel AA1WH - shall, during the absence of the President, perform the duties and assume the responsibilities of the President.

Treasurer – Duane KC1FQV - shall receive all moneys due the Corporation and shall disburse the same according to the will of the Directors. The Treasurer shall keep accurate books and records of all of transactions and shall publish monthly financial reports to the membership. The Treasurer shall perform all other functions normally necessary and required of the position.

Secretary – Paul NF1G - shall keep records of all meetings of the Corporation and of its Directors, shall maintain a directory of the membership, shall be responsible for all notices and correspondence as may be required and necessary and shall do all other things necessary and required of the position.

Technical Director – Najm AB1ZA - Will have the responsibly for all technical aspects of the Corporation to include but not limited to RFI problems.

Program Director - Gary AA1UE - Will select guest speakers for general Corporation meetings.

Membership Director – John K1VOI - Shall actively recruit new members at times and places of their discretion, and represent the Corporation in a manner to create growth of the organization.

 $New sletter\ Director-John\ N1JIE\ -\ Will\ have\ the\ responsibility\ to\ write\ and\ publish\ the\ Corporation\ new sletter.$

Director At-Large – Bob WA10JN - Shall assist any corporate Directors as deemed necessary.

Other information is there, regarding meetings, approval of expenditures, etc. Did you know that Board meetings are open to members? If you are interested in listening in, contact Larry W1AST to get the meeting time and Zoom link. We would love to have any member attend and see how we work to make HCRA better.





Little known standard electronic symbols.






"I've Never Seen The Band's So Dead"




Clublog update: Clublog can be accessed at https://clublog.org/league.php Signup is free, and there are a number of ways to lookup information. Give it a try.

Meteor showers—

Meteor showers are interesting, romantic, awe inspiring on a quiet dark night. But they also do things to the atmosphere—like ionize it for a few moments. This is one of the causes of "Sporadic E" - the ionization of the E layer of the magnetic fields around the Earth. And what this can do is open up 10m and vhf bands to long distance communication.

Northern Taurid 10/20-12/20 peak mid Nov

Leonid 11/6-11/30 Geminid mid Dec Ursid late Dec
