HAM APPS FOR ANDROID PHONES

I was looking for a reason to go sit at my picnic table on this beautiful, early March 84 degree day. Taking my laptop out and writing another article for Zero Beat sounded like a great reason. The early season warmth sure felt good!

Since I last wrote about a few apps, a few more good ones have come out that are worth mentioning.

March. 10

1. N1KDO's LoTW Look: This app allows you to view and see contacts as Logbook Of The World (LOTW) confirms them. From the attached picture from my phone, you can see new confirmations as they come in. Tap on a call and it'll give you basics such as call worked, entity name, date and time worked and some other info. You can also do a search for a certain call or date range, mode, band, etc. It's a free app and you just need to sign in with your LOTW credentials to make it work.

2. Ham Clock: I was using a different app for a 24 hour clock, but this one is much simpler and easier to read. (Thanks to Gary, WA1MOW for the tip). While portable, I rarely log by computer or tablet or phone. I have an old fashioned

log book I use and have been using for years. For some reason, I always write down the wrong GMT 100:00 time when not using a clock. Ham Clock fixes this. It gives 24 hour local time, the date and 24 hour GMT time with the date. Settings are few with display timeout minutes, date format, the ability t hide the local clock or change the color scheme (a bit). The app is free.

I have mine showing only GMT time as I do not need local time in 24 hour format. And yes, at 0000 it does change the date to the next day correctly. It is a free app and is made by Zoran Tools. Just seach ham clock in the Google Play Store and you'll find it. (see the 2 screen samples)

3. **KX3 Companion**: I've just started tinkering with the KX3 Companion on my Samsung Galaxy Tab Pro tablet. It connects to the KX3 via the KX3 usb cable and an adapter (OTG adapter) to go to micro usb. Here is the web site: http://kx3companion.com/ There is a \$6.99 charge for the full version with a trial version that is free and very limited.

Since I did not do any portable operation during winter, I didn't use this much except to tinker with. But very soon, I'll be camping again and plan on using it a lot and will review it in full then. The website says it will send and receive CW, PSK31 and RTTY via a tablet or phone. The app lets you record full gso's on the tablet for future playback and export to your favorite logging program, plot frequency range and SWR, audio spectrum and waterfall thru the audio out port. It will make use of a blue tooth keyboard for sending/typing the messages. Also supports interaction with a number of KX3 accessories. It looks like one cool app that I can't wait to start working with. (see pic)

THE RADIO AMATEUR'S CODE

LARRY MAKOSKI W2LJ

CONSIDERATE: He/[She] never knowingly operates in such a way as to lessen the pleasure of others.

LOYAL: He/[She] offers loyalty, encouragement and support to other amateurs, local clubs, the IARU

Radio Society in his/[her] country, through which Amateur Radio in his/[her] country is

represented nationally and internationally.

PROGRESSIVE: He/[She] keeps his/[her] station up to date. It is well-built and efficient. His/[Her] operating

practice is above reproach.

FRIENDLY: He/[She] operates slowly and patiently when requested; offers friendly advice and counsel to

beginners; kind assistance, cooperation and consideration for the interests of others. These are

the marks of the amateur spirit.

BALANCED: Radio is a hobby, never interfering with duties owed to family, job, school or community.

PATRIOTIC: His/[Her] station and skills are always ready for service to country and community.

The original version of this was written in 1928, by Paul M Segal W9EEA, and it's been modified over the years as things change with the times. The core message remains the same though, as it's pretty much timeless.

The one trait that I want to touch upon today, is the "Balanced" one.

The Radio Amateur is: **BALANCED**: Radio is a hobby, never interfering with duties owed to family, job, school or community.

Sometimes, I think we forget this one the most, and the evidence is not that hard to find. Take a wander on over to Facebook, or listen to a repeater and it's pretty obvious that some of us become seriously preoccupied or obsessed with such activities as NPOTA, contesting, DXing, county hunting, SOTA, etc.

Amateur Radio, on the whole, and these activities in particular *are* good and wholesome things. For instance, I'm certain that a lot of our wives, husbands and significant others would rather have us in the shack, yakking away on our radios than spending the month's mortgage money in bars, saloons, casinos or race tracks.

But it's easy to lose focus and become obsessed. Radio sport that involves chasing that elusive country, county, SOTA peak, NPOTA entity or whatever should never become the focus of our lives, or our reason for being. Just as purchasing that new rig, antenna, or piece of test equipment should never result in being unable to pay the mortgage, rent or put food on the table. It should also never result in the kid's college fund being raided.

Do you enter the shack on a Friday night for a contest, *only* to emerge late Sunday evening or early Monday morning? That's not good, my friends.

Even an essential thing can become bad, if you're not careful. Are you that someone who HAS to be at every civic function or training class? Even public service, as worthy and noble a cause as it is, should never become between you and your family. Before going out to respond to any disaster or emergency, the health and welfare of your loved ones should always be your top priority. If they're not taken care of, you don't go.

The bottom line is that there's more to life than Amateur Radio. In our quest to satisfy our passion, sometimes we forget that. Family, friends, loved ones and those relationships are way more important, and should always come before getting that high score, or working that 300th country or buying that newest, latest and greatest radio.

Always keep in the back of your mind that the greatest gift you can give your family is your time. If you're doing OK with that, then you're doing a good job with the "Balanced" part of The Radio Amateur's Code.

ARRL TELLS FCC TO RESTORE BALANCE OF MODES ON 80 AND 75 METERS:

In comments filed on March 23 on its Petition for Rule Making (RM 11759) seeking changes to 80 and 75 meters, the ARRL has told the FCC that its primary objective is to "rebalance" the bands by correcting a 10-year old FCC error.

"ARRL's proposal is not fairly viewed as a proposal to take anything away from anyone," the League's comments assured. "It is more properly viewed as the effectuation of a fair, equitable, and efficient 'band plan' looking forward for the foreseeable future that balances everyone's needs, and which remedies a plainly unfair plan, imprudently created in the 2006 Report and Order in WT Docket 04-140." The ARRL has announced that currently they have 111 co-sponsors for US House Bill HR-1301. There is now 2 members of Congress from Massachusetts, District #2 James McGovern (D), and District #5 Katherine Clark (D), District #1 (Where most of the HCRA resides.) Richard Neil has yet to sign on. It is time for us to step up and get involved. You can find more information on getting involved here.

Senate Bill S-1685 currently has only 2 co-sponsors: Sen Roger Wicker of Mississippi , and Sen Richard Blumenthal of Connecticut.

To separate fact from fiction, the ARRL produced a video. <u>Click here to watch</u>. (Look for a familiar face at 4:55)


