Old Business: None.


New Business:

Speaking of 5A7A, I managed to work them on 20, 40, 80, and 160. I hope everyone else had as much fun working them (or trying to work them) as I did. Hopefully, we'll see this entity lit up more as time goes on, especially with the reception they have received from the ham community. If you have not had a chance to work them yet, they departed at the end of November, but expect there to be more 5A prefixes on, soon.

Dr. DX Continued



In the meantime, I stumbled upon a list of pileup "busting" techniques I had [somewhere along the line] compiled and saved. Hopefully, they will aid you in catching that rare A3!

- 1. Complete callsign: The DX op will *always* try to catch the most complete callsign on the first call. Don't be tempted by others in the pileup to say the last two letters of your call.
- 2. Tuning patterns: It is not rare for a DX op with a big pileup to tune up or down .1 or .2, just to see who he can hear well. Often, they do this in patterns. Learn the pattern; don't be afraid to listen to five or six other stations do the same. He might go up two, then down two, or down two and then up two. It depends on the op.
- 3. Timing is everything: The greatest tools we have are our own callsigns. This is truly a "master class" skill. Experienced operators know enough to give a slight delay, and then call in to make their callsigns stand out. This takes time, practice, and patience, but is the most effective technique.
- 4. No DX cops: Bad operators are all over the place. Don't try to fix them, especially in the middle of a pileup. Stay quiet, and please don't contribute to the noise. Likewise, don't respond to anyone exhibiting such behavior. The DX is equally aggravated, and you can bet that station is at the bottom of his list to call.
- 5. The DX is the boss: If the DX station decides he wants to go by numbers, follow his commands. If you are a "1", go *only* after he asks for the "1" calls. If he decides to listen up, tune your transmitting VFO up and call him there. Again, he is the boss!
- 6. Let the big gun stations work him on the first call: Just because the DX hasn't chosen you, yet, doesn't mean he hasn't heard you. It makes more sense for him to get the guys with the big signals out of the way so he can hear you. Let him work the big guys, and don't get frustrated. It might take a little pistol or a medium-sized station three, four, or twenty-four calls. Patience is the key!
- 7. It is his job to say his call: Don't ask "your call?" during a pileup. Say your callsign. If he works you, ask him his callsign then. Spouting out questions in the middle of a calling period just adds to the noise. During a contest, if you want to know if he is a duplicate or not, work him anyway. They don't hurt your score, and often just calling in once (especially if he has already heard you) is much shorter than having to say "your call?" two or three times.
- 8. Work split: Don't be intimidated by split. It is a much desired skill, and one that is, truly, not that difficult to learn. Read the manual for your radio. The juiciest 40 meter DX likes to hang out just under your band edge!

Also this month, the ARRL 10 Meter Contest. This is a great contest that is easy to operate, but still a blast. We will be operating multi/single from here, just to generate as many points as we can for the club. I hope to hear you on, even if you are just there to make one or two QSO's. Submitting your log is easy, and instructions can be found on www.arrl.org/contest. Every point will help HCRA stay competitive!

Get on and make some QSO's! The DX won't work themselves!

ARRL 10 Meter Contest Are You In ? ? ?

The contest dates this year are 0000 UTC December 9th to 2400 UTC December 10th. Adjusting for local time this means the contest starts at 7:00 PM Friday evening December 8th and ends at 7:00 PM Sunday evening December 10th. During this 48 hour period the idea is to make as many contacts on 10 meters, in as many states or countries as possible. Contacts may be made on either phone or CW. But I guess the big question is, why would you want to participate in the first place?

Well, how about its fun? Is that a good enough reason? There are lots of others, including working on your WAS (Worked All States), DXCC (DX Century Club), learning how to be a better operator, testing station improvements, winning awards.... I'm guessing FUN is the operative word here though.

One neat thing about this contest is it allows you to participate as an individual and HCRA to submit scores as a club. All you need to do is indicate your club affiliation when sending in your log and both you and HCRA get credit. Over the last five years between six and twelve folks have participated in putting HCRA on top in Western Massachusetts. Wouldn't it be great to be back on top again this year? All it takes is a little effort on your part (effort = fun) and we can do it again.

Because we are at the bottom of the sunspot cycle this is a contest that won't take anywhere 48 hours. But that doesn't mean there won't be good DX. If you have a beam try following the sun across the sky and see who you can work. The process is simple. Listen for a station calling "CQ contest" and give them a call. They will come back to you with your signal report and their location. When you answer simply give them back their signal report and your state. For a station in Massachusetts you might say, "AA1YW this is KK1W, 59, Massachusetts (Mike Alpha)". That's all there is to it. Write it down in your log and move on to the next contact. It is fun, and can also become a little addictive too.

If you are new to contesting or HF and want to give the contest a try but have more questions please drop me an email and I'll do my best to show you how to have fun this December.

FCC "Omnibus" Amateur Radio R&O Takes Effect December 15

When I first heard about the Omnibus Amateur Radio *Report and Order (R&O)*, I didn't expect to have to worry about any changes for at least a year or so. Wrong! The FCC surprised me by publishing a revised version of the *R&O* in the *Federal Register* on November 15, making the effective date for the *R&O* changes this December 15. So I thought I had better see what this is all about and how it might affect my operating activities.

I decided the easiest way to see what was changing was to compare the new band allocations to the current ones as shown on the *ARRL US Amateur Bands* chart (see links below). Checking the League Web site, I found they already have a new chart available that shows the band layouts effective on the fifteenth. Comparing the two charts made it easy to see where the changes were occurring.

Looking at the changes, band by band, let's see who the winners and losers are:

- **80 Meters:** The phone sub-band moves down to 3600 kHz for Extras, 3700 kHz for Advanced and 3800 kHz for General class licensees, giving the Extras an additional 150 kHz of phone space, the Advanced 75 kHz and the Generals 50 kHz. Novices now have the same cw sub-band as the Advanced and Generals; 3525 to 3600 kHz and the Extras retain their exclusive bottom 25 kHz on cw.
- **40 Meters:** The phone sub-band moves down 25 kHz to 7125 kHz, giving Extras and Advanced class ops 25 kHz more phone space, while Generals gain 50 kHz, with their sub-band moving down to 7175 kHz. Novices, Generals and Advanced ops all have 7025 to 7125 kHz for cw only and the Extras retain their 25 kHz, bottom of the band segment.
- **15 Meters:** Here the Novices and Generals make some more gains. The General phone band is increased by 25 kHz, down to 21,275 kHz and the Novice cw band is extended down to 21,025 kHz, adding 75 kHz and making it the same as the Advanced and General sub-band.
- **10 Meters:** The Novice operators gain 100 kHz of cw space on this band, with the cw sub-band being extended from 28,300 all the way to 28,000 kHz. The Novice phone allocation of 28,300 to 28,500 kHz remains the same.

All the other bands remain unchanged and, as is the current rule, Technicians with 5-wpm code have the same HF privileges as Novices.

As far as winners or losers, I'll let you make that call. Although I spend most of my HF operating time on cw, I don't expect the "loss" of some cw only spectrum to have much impact on my operating, almost all of which is in the bottom 75 kHz of the bands. It does mean that there will be less

space for RTTY on 80 meters, which may impact both RTTY and cw ops alike. I like the Novice expansion, but think it came years too late and really won't make much difference.

There is much more to the Omnibus Amateur Radio *R&O* and we should all have a look at the details, which are available to everyone on the ARRL Web site. Those interested in HF digital modes especially should have a close look at the new allocations. Here are some links to the League Web sites.
