TRAFFIC The pleas of the past two issues seem to have gone unheeded, at least on by WIRHU the CW nets. On the 3.725 mc net, we need coverage for some of the other cities in W. Mass. At present we have reliable coverage for Springfield, Wilbraham, Westfield, Worthington, usually Pittsfield, and sometimes Adams. If you can't keep the schedules every night, get on when you can. Where are some of you guys in Holyoke, Northampton, Chicopee and surrounding towns?

If you have a rig, but no code speed, and still don't believe we will QRS, get on and try it sometime. We don't QRS now because there is no one on the net that needs a QRS. If you haven't any rig on 80 CW, arrange a schedule on some other

band once or twice weekly with a regular member of the net. How about some more activity on the 2200 WMM, especially Friday nights? It is Friday that we need to clean our hooks as much as possible, to prepare for the weekend. And it is the late session that needs members, because we get the traffic from 1RN and EAN for distribution between the 1900 and 2200 sessions. How can NTS work at top efficiency when there isn't sufficient coverage on the section level to back it up? Mailing a radiogram isn't too efficient. We also need more traffic originated to increase activity. Ideal would be for everyone to originate 5 messages a week. If you can't hit this, try for as many as possible. If you can't get on 80, put them on the 10 meter net Thursday night.

(Ed. note: 1KFV is close on their heels and needs only 81 cards for his phone LXCC). The winners for last year's CQ DX contest repeated again this year - 1JYH on cw and 1CJK on phone. In the phone section, LPDF took second with LRDR third and on cw, LPDF also placed second and LEDb was third. IIJT took over the key at 1PDF during the contest. New countries and new QSL's are keeping the DX gang happy and leading the pack is LJYH who added VQl, FNS, SP5 and VS9 for 210 worked and a card from VP5BD in the Caymans gave him 183 confirmed. (IKFV modestly refrains from admitting that he just worked VPSAO in the So. Shetland Is. for 171 worked and 149 confirmed). Top phone man, 1PDF, added CR5, CR6 and HR in the phone contest and VS2, VS6, FE8, CT3, PK3, 4X4 and TF in the cw portion to bring his total to 133 - 103 cards on phone and 110 for phone and cw. The CQ contest kept 1E0E happy with FESAB and MD4GC bringing his total to 107. 

CONTESTS The CQ DX contest was pretty well covered by 1KFV in his DX column. Bot mentioned the first three in each category, but the HCHC was well represented on all bands by at least a dozen participants — nice going, gang. It is too early yet to tell what the outcome of the SS will be but on CW, 1EOB and 1JYH are running neck and neck as are 1RZG and 1RHU. 1IJT is in there pitching along with 1BVR and a few others. On phone, 1CJK has a good start with 1RDR, 1RRW, 1RRX, 1NY, 1NLE and others giving him plenty of competition. In the next issue our new contest editor, 1EOB, will take over and give you the results. Some of the cw scores may be lower than expected because of the extremely poor conditions on the low frequencies during the first weekend. Apparently, the W2 and W3 boys in the heavily populated areas did not suffer as much as some of the W1's because some of them were heard sending nos. in the 500's and even a couple in the 600's late Sunday evening. 1JYH and 1EOB are willing to chip in and finance any Private Eye who can find out what the secret is that 2IOP, 4KFC and 3BES seem to have.

EVERYONE PLEASE BRING YOUR SWEEPSTAKES SCORES TO THE MEETING DEC. 9 AND GIVE THEM TO VIC PAOUNOFF, WIEOB, OR IF YOU CAN'T AFTEND THE MEETING, SEE THAT VIC GETS YOUR SCORE AS SOON AS POSSIBLE. Here is what we want: Number of different stations worked, number of different sections worked, final score. The final score is computed by multiplying your points (at 2 points per contact) by your number of sections. If you used 100 watts or less, multiply your score by 1.25. For example; If you worked 100 stations in 50 sections and used 100 watts input, your score would be as follows. 100 x 2 = 200 points. 200 x 50 = 10,000. 10,000 x 1.25 = 12,500 Final Score. Also, remember that the highest scorer on phone and on cw (within the club) will get a certificate from ARRL. If you happen to win one of them, don't get impatient if you don't get it in a few months. They have quite a few to fill out and you will get yours in about a year! The same goes for the medallion awarded for the section winner.

This month we had plenned to discuss bendpass filters for TVI reduction, but the "G.E. Ham News" for December 1949 beat us to the draw. We suggest that all who experience TVI get a copy of "Ham News" and go to work. The filters described therein are much better then the general run of low pass filters on the market today. Since we were scooped on our original plans, here is a trick that we tried on LJYH's BO542N which proved to be quite a help to the overall selectivity. It can be applied to any type of receiver and we hope that you may first it useful.

The idea of controlled regeneration in the I.F. strip of a receiver is not new but since it is given little attention in the handbooks, and since it will sharpen the selectivity curve of the receiver to a surprising dgree, and give an increase in gain to boot, we thought it well worth a review.

The above circuit is almost self-explanatory with the exception of the feed-back capacity, Cx. This condenser consists of two pieces of push-back type-book-up wire twisted together. The most practical way to get the correct capacity is to twist about eight turns and then, with wire-cutters, cut off small emounts until, with the regeneration control (R1) full on, the 1.F. stage will oscillate and will stop when the control is backed off. On the BC-342, a twist of two turns was found to be sufficient. The greatest selectivity and gain will be obtained with the regeneration control set just below the point of oscillation.
