

The 2004 Dayton Hamvention

May 13th – May 17th 2004 By Larry Krainson – WB1DBY

We actually started planning our trip the last few days of May 2003. John – N1JIO, Irv – W6IS and myself were returning from the highly rated, but not very good Rochester, NY State Convention.

We talked it up amongst our friends and hoped we could find two more people to join us for the trip. A few months later, Frank – WA1UIL committed. One seat left.

December 2003 arrived and I decided I had waited long enough and started doing a hotel search. I was looking for something within 10 miles of the Hara Arena where the Hamvention is held. I found a hotel 3½ miles from the Arena. It had a decent rating in AAA and a decent nightly price of \$61 per night. I locked it in for a 4-night stay. In the mean time, I had John order 4 tickets in advance. That way we didn't have to spend time in a long line and pay the at the door price of \$25 per ticket.

About 6 weeks before our departure date, Eric – N1QKO decided he was our fourth person. Eric mentioned he had his APRS working and we would run it from the car. Our vehicle was full. We had our group. We spent the next few weeks watching the additions to the Hamvention web page (www.hamvention.org).

Thursday morning May 13th, 6:30am. I left my house and headed to Johns house where I would be meeting the guys. No traffic in Longmeadow or on the South End Bridge and it was a beautiful, sunny day. A good sign. We piled everyone's stuff into the car and activated Eric's APRS station. We left Johns house about 7:15 am. Only 765 miles and 12 plus hours of driving to go.

I did have Jim - KK1W and Dave - AA1YW cell phone numbers to keep in touch with them as they were in another car and left a few hours before us. They had a 4am departure planned. But they were running a few hours behind but still ahead of us.

The trip went easy. Very little traffic. Lots of good conversation and laughs. We didn't even turn on the 2-meter until we were in Ohio. Ironically, as we stopped for gas on the right side of the road we saw Dave's truck pulling out across the street. We caught up and chatted for most of the few hours left on the ride.

By 8:30pm we were checked into the hotel. We found a place for dinner and planned for the first day of the show to leave the hotel at 7:30. We had a decent breakfast, parked and were at the front door of the arena by 9am.

I decided I wanted to start indoors thinking that since it was sunny, the flea market would be busy. My thinking paid off, as it was easy to walk around and see things. I did a quick once thru in about 3 hours.

There are 5 large rooms inside housing some 600+ vendors. All the big manufacturers were there; Yaesu, Kenwood, Icom, Alinco, Cushcraft, MFJ, Steppir, Hygain, AES, HRO, ARRL, CQ. Booth after booth. Lots to see, examine, shmoose over. After a few hours people started streaming indoors as it started to rain. This was my queue to dig out my rain gear and go outside.



Eric had found me and we started at one end of the flea and started walking. This was one enormous flea market. Take the largest at New Hampshire and multiple it several times. The rows seemed endless. One guy was selling home made anemometers made from bicycle computers and a wind gauge. Eric bought one. I was tempted but resisted. Cables, tools, radio covers, old radios, tons of HT's, Military equipment and much more.

After walking for about $1\frac{1}{2}$ hours we found the AA1YW/KK1W booth. They had already sold much of what they had brought. They bought a few things too. Jim – W1EQO and Steve – N1SR were peddling W1EQO's neat miniature battery operated cameras.

We saw a plane ejection seat for sale at only \$1200. Maybe next time. How about windsocks, power poles, batteries, neat stuff? We decide to leave and find a good place to eat. But one of the things we noticed around the area was there were so many fast food places. After some talking with some locals we found ourselves in Beaver Creek about 20 miles outside of Dayton. Lots of paces to sit down and eat. We chose a restaurant named Hops (www.hopsonline.com). There's nothing like a great meal and a 23-ounce beer to go with it.

Saturday we returned and I wanted to go much more slowly around the interior of the arena. I found all sorts of little things I didn't know I needed, but bought anyways. Picked up some things on my list. Listened to sales pitches. Saw the new Icom IC-7800 HF rig. It could be mine for only \$10,559. Yaesu was showing (under glass) their new FT-9000dx. The 200-watt model was around \$11,500 and the 400-watt model is only \$13,500. That's a bit pricey for me.

Nearly any manufacturer that you could think of and many more were here. It is the premiere ham radio convention. I spent all day inside, as did many people, as the flea market was a wash due to much rain.

Around 4:30 pm, I found the rest of my crew. They were pretty much overwhelmed by the amount of booths and stuff and decided to leave for dinner. Since we enjoyed ourselves so much, we went back to Hops.

Sunday we were up at our usual time. Had breakfast in the same place and was back at the arena for the final few hours of the show. We took care of the last minute shopping indoors and out. It was finally nice outside. We also kept checking our tickets to see if we won any prizes. Anything that wasn't claimed for prizes was being redrawn at 1pm. We decided to stick around and try our luck. It didn't do any good, as we didn't win anything.

Around 2pm Sunday we headed to the USAF Air Museum. (www.wpafb.af.mil/museum). We spent the next 2½ hours wandering the museum. It is huge and impossible to see everything. I pretty much ran thru the museum looking for displays that I hadn't seen two years earlier. The time still went too fast. We did bump into Dave, Jim, Jim and Steve, which was good as we planned to meet them at the Young's Dairy Restaurant for dinner. (www.youngsdairy.com) Now we could follow them. They gave us a nice scenic tour of the Ohio countryside.

The food was delicious and the meals were large. We also wanted to try dessert and had to leave room. After finally finishing, we decided to go back to Hops for another beer. It was our last night in Ohio and it was enjoyed with good company and good friends. We were leaving Monday.

Monday arrived and it was a perfect day for driving. John was the first driver. Somewhere near the Pennsylvania line we were discussing how unusual it was for cars to come steaming up the left lane and slow way down when they approached us. We couldn't figure out what was going on.

We did have the APRS on again. It was on for the journey down Thursday, then all day Sunday and Monday. Around the time we were leaving Ohio we got a call from a ham named Fritz. He called us on 52 about the blue minivan going around 74-mph. We figured that there was a ham cop warning us about our speed and looked around but couldn't find anyone.

Fritz then mentioned he was relaying for KK1W and watching us on APRS. He warned us to slow down a bit and we did. Jim was about an hour ahead of us. We drove on and stopped for lunch in Dunkirk, NY. After leaving the restaurant, we heard AA1YW on 52. He was nearby in the next town. Still ahead of us. We gassed up and headed home again.

Just passed Syracuse we ran into a long traffic jam. I called Dave on the cell and asked how long the traffic was. After some confusing mile marker chatter, it was determined that they were *behind* us. With our help, they avoided the hour-long delay and bypassed the traffic jam.

In the meantime, Eric gave me the frequency for CB CH 19. We dialed it into the FT-100 and heard lots of chatter. But one thing in particular got our interest. The truckers were telling everyone to "watch for the Massachusetts lawmen in the blue minivan with all the antennas and radios on." We laughed our heads off as they were referring to us. And it finally made sense as to why cars slowed down when they approached our van. They thought we were cops!

We finally caught up to Dave and the gang. They stopped for dinner while we were stuck in the 9-mile long traffic mess. In our car, we were munching on breakfast bars and snacks.

We finally arrived back at Johns house around 11:15pm and I was home by 11:35pm.

It was an awesome trip. We had lots of fun and great company. We're planning on going again for the 2006 Dayton Hamvention. Maybe that year there will be three or four cars from the HCRA?
