
## Wifi inside a KX3



While browsing info on the 'Piglet' on Nick Garner's <u>Pignology</u> web site the thought struck me, I wonder if I could install a version of the Piglet inside my KX3. I built my KX3 from a kit and never installed the battery holders or the internal charger. I've always operated the rig from an external supply, either Lipo batteries or from a 12 VDC supply in the shack. Looking at the size of the Piglet I thought there might be room enough to fit it *inside* the KX3.

A few emails back and forth with Nick/N3WG, (the guy behind the pig) confirmed the possibility. Nick suggested a through-hole version of the board, minus the DB9 and Power Poles connectors, for experimentation. A few days later the parts showed up and it was off to the races – another first for Muppet Labs. Actually It turned out to be an easy project and enables logging with Pignology's <u>Hamlog</u> app without having to deal with wires.

The first 'trial by fire' was on top of Cascade Mountain in the Adirondacks. I brought along pencil and paper as backup but Nick's Hamlog software and the built in Piglet worked perfectly. I logged 22 contacts without a hitch. I was using the Android version of the app which unfortunately does not export a SOTA compatible .csv file but Nick may add that in the future, soon I hope. I experienced intermittent cell service while on which let Hamlog look up callers in QRZ while I was logging. Very cool to be able to answer someone with a 'Thanks Barry, you're 599 72'', making a personable, but quick QSO. The photo shows the 'shack' on top of Cascade (3880') but not the phone I was using for logging because? You guessed it, I was also using the same phone to take the picture!





#### What you get is a really cool, KX3/W - not everyone has one of those, right?

This mod isn't for everyone. You should be comfortable with soldering in tight places and not afraid to damage a \$1000 radio. Battery drain is increased as the Piglet draws 70 ma, and you have to disconnect it if you want to use the ACC1 jack to update firmware or use a different logging program. For my use this is perfectly acceptable. The ease of logging and (hopefully) log upload to the SOTA database make it perfect. As always YMMV. # Field Day 2014: June 28th & 29th

There is less than a month to go before HCRA's biggest event of the year and your chance to participate in Field Day. We will be back again this year as a 5A (5 stations on emergency power) at School Street Park in Agawam in roughly the same area of the park as last year. We will be setting up towers on Friday, stations will be setup Friday afternoon/evening and Saturday morning. Operating starts at 2pm on Saturday and goes straight through until 2pm Sunday when breakdown begins.

We need YOU! We need folks to help setup, operate and breakdown the site. Please remember that Field Day is an emergency preparedness event and learning to setup and take down the club's portable towers is a great skill to have. Also, because control operators will be present anyone has the opportunity to operate regardless of license class at the various stations. We will get you all setup and can help with logging. Just come on by and ask someone to put you on a radio. This is a 24-hour operating event and we can't keep all of these stations going unless we have enough operators, so please come down and have some fun making contacts.

Don't forget that as part of our June club meeting, I will be giving an interactive presentation on using the N1MM logging software that we use at Field Day. It will be a great chance to learn a little about the software and find out how easy it really is to use. I'll also be going over some operating tips specifically for Field Day.



This is my personal invitation to you to attend the **2014 ARRL National Centennial Convention**, July 17-19 in nearby Hartford, Connecticut. Advance registration is recommended, and you may do so by visiting ARRL2014.org. I recommend that you register as quickly as possible.

This is a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to come together with other members and friends as we celebrate the very best of the ARRL and Amateur Radio. Already, registrations have been received from all 50 states and 22 countries. This will be a CELEBRATION to remember!

The event is being held at the Connecticut Convention Center in downtown Hartford, within arm's reach of the picturesque Connecticut River. This is a handsome, modern facility where we'll host all of the convention activities. A free shuttle connects many of downtown hotel options (visit ARRL2014.org for convention rates at nearby hotels). The convention center is handicap accessible.

On Thursday, July 17th, the ARRL Centennial Convention will feature all-day training tracks (advance registration is required). These workshops will be led by the top national-level trainers and experts in Amateur Radio. On Friday, July 18th, and Saturday, July 19th, the convention will feature a huge exhibit hall and 70+ hours of forums and special presentations. FEMA Administrator Craig Fugate, KK4INZ will give the keynote address at the Centennial Banquet on Friday night (over 600 have registered already!), and Nobel Prize Winner, Joe Taylor, K1JT, will speak Saturday at noon.

ARRL Headquarters in nearby Newington is rolling out the red carpet for all convention attendees. Shuttle buses will run attendees to ARRL HQ (about 15 minutes away) for tours of the main administrative building, grounds & antenna farm, and W1AW—the Hiram Percy Maxim Memorial Station. If you've never visited 225 Main Street, now's your chance!

Bring the entire family! We have tours planned on Friday and Saturday for spouses, companions or any family members who might not be interested in attending the convention activities. On Friday, a tour is planned of the Mark Twain House and Harriet Beecher Stowe Center; On Saturday, a visit to the Wadsworth Atheneum—the oldest public art museum in the US. These tours require convention registration. The Connecticut Science Center is next door to the convention center—and is offering half-price admission to all convention registrants and their families throughout weekend.
