VHF Results

The Results for the 1987 ARRL VHF Sweepstakes are in and the HCRA has broken its all time high record! This year's score was a wopping 319,783 points. Even more notable was another record breaking all time high of 54 entries! Many thanks to all those members who assisted us in our goals — it really shows!

This was the first time that the club has placed in the Unlimited Category. We were both second place, and last place. The Mount Airy VHF Club (PA) scored over 1.5 million points with 59 entries!

Our third-of-a-million points still placed us fourth overall in all categories in the country. Its interesting to note that the other three clubs who totalled more points than we did each have VHF in their name. But the HCRA has VHF in its blood; many an old timer will tell you stories of the early days and the experimentation on these bands that occured right here in our area. I'm sure that many of them will be glad to see that the tradition continues...

Additional congrads to the Mount Tom ARA who placed 10th in the Medium Category with 11,528 points and 12 entries. These combined scores show that although Western Massachusetts is one of the smallest ARRL sections in the country we have one of the largest turnouts for the January VHF contests. Let's keep that in mind next year as we try to shatter 1987's records. Of course we appreciate your support with the log submission, but the most important thing is that you get on and operate!

Our own KA1ZE, with 89,232 points single operator style, placed third in the country, and took the New England Division title. Congrads Stan!

The HCRA club station W1NY cranked out a score of 135,786 points to take first place in the multioperator category in New England and fourth place in the country. Kudos to the W1NY team of AC1T, KA1KPH, N1DPM, NC1B, NC1I, W1KK, WA1UQC, and WB1FCG.

Buy your raffel tickets today! HCRA ZERO BEAT June 1987 Looking at Multipliers (grid squares worked), single op stations KA1ZE logged 20 grids on 220 MHz for a tie for second place, while K1FO managed to snag 32 grids on 432 MHz. Good job Stan and Steve!

The guys at W1NY placed in the top ten multiplier leader ranks for each band they operated. They were in 7th place on 50 MHz; 10th place on 2m, tied for 4th place on 220 MHz, and also 7th place on both 432 and 1296 MHz. Pretty good job for a station who's antennas are less than 200 feet above sea level!

On 220 MHz KA1ZE scored 3,160 points for second place in the country, while K1FO took first place on 432 MHz with 10,688 points followed by KA1ZE with 5,712 points. These guys really do know how to contest!

N1DPM and KA1KRJ just missed placing first in the section with very fine scores indeed. And WB1HAB with assistance from KA1MEW who has a much better voice also scored well, breaking the five digit barrier. All stations who submitted their logs through the club will receive a special certificate, which will be available at the annual meeting. In addition, we hope to have special awards ready for the top ranking club stations. Make sure to make your reservations for the banquet and awards presentation.

You can find all the results starting on page 75 of the June 1987 issue of QST. It would not be final without a quote from the comments of the published results by K1BE. "I was in an ice-fishing contest during the VHF SS. When my, "tip-up" flag signaled a fish onthe line, I'd run out, reel in the fish, then get back to the radio to make a big 'catch' on VHF." Digipeater

Recently work was done on the W1NY-1 digipeater to realign the receiver and transmitter. The transmitter audio deviation was reset and equalized. Currently the equipment is in good working order. The borrowed amp runs 42 watts out and the antenna match shows a 1.3:1 VSWR. Future plans and upgrades include the purchase of an amp to increase the power to 100 watts for aproximately 350 watts ERP. Possible enhancements to the receiver are being looked at to improve adjacent channel selectivty.

A "contest style" station will be setup on 20m, with a mono-band beam. Additional stations will also be available on 10 & 15 meters. Although we have a few people who have already come forward and stated their interest in helping out with one or more of these bands, we're still looking for more people! Not only operators, but those who may want to help build the station and erect the antennas. If you live in an apartment, or the XYL won't let you erect that array you've always wanted, here's your chance! We will supply the parts, you supply the grunt work!

Of course, what would Field Day be without a Novice station. And we plan to have at least one Novice station since this year Novices can yack with their new phone privileges on 10 meters. Of course, we need Novice operators to rack up a few points on 15m CW too. So limber up your fist and give us a hand. Our Novice station will also be equipped with real rigs and beam antennas for that extra added touch. Our Novice team captain is Kevin KA1QAH, who recently received his Novice ticket after a nine week wait! So look for QAH in addition to W1NY on the bands if you can't stop by.

We will also have a Packet station to get the extra 100 bonus points. If you still have not been bitten by the packet bug, stop by and see a packet station on 2m in operation.

Dayton Notes

You may have heard some of these already or were lucky enough to be there in person, but for those of you who missed it.....

The Dayton HamVention® had over 27,000 hams making it a new record in paid attendance. Several of the large equipment dealers reported sales on Friday of over \$100,000 with total sales over the weekend over \$250,000. And who said Ham Radio was not commercial?

There was plenty of new equipment either announced or on display. Some of the more interesting were:

From ICOM the IC-900, a fiber optic multiband FM mobile transceiver for six bands 10m through 1.2 GHz.. The unit is completely remotable from a small controller which can be placed on a visor or windshield, with the individual band units placed in the trunk. Also from ICOM were the IC-375A and IC-275 all-mode 220 MHz and 2m transceivers.

Kenwood had its new FT-23R and FT-73R 2m and 70cm hand-helds on display. In addition, they were showing the new IP-100 Illustphone, which, when used in conjunction with an VHF/UHF FM transceiver, will transmit graphics and pictures to another amateur station similarly equipped. What will they think of next?

Yaesu was showing a new line of 25 watt FM transceivers for 2m, 220 MHz, and 70cm, and 10 watts on 1.2 GHz.

Ten-Tec was exhibiting its new Paragon HF transceiver with a general coverage receiver. Company officials present said the first Paragons would be available in late May

Finally, Heathkit has not forgotten Amateur Radio, and had its new SB-1000 kilowatt amp and HK-232 TNC on display. The HK-232 can decode weather pictures, work VHF packet up to 9.6k baud, plus CW, RTTY, AMTOR and ASCII. Hmmm.....

Next year's HamVention will be on April 29 through May 1. If you're planning on going better make your reservations now! See you there!

Field Day Info

If you are unable to join us for Field Day, please make an effort to participate, either from home, or from another Field Day operation. The MTARA is also planning a Field Day operation locally, so there is plenty of operating positions available!

All the details can be found starting on page 87 of the May 1987 issue of QST. We've provided most of the details here, in summary, for your review.

The contest starts at 1800 UTC on Saturday 27-Jun-87 and ends at 2100 UTC on Sunday 28-Jun-87. If you begin your portable station setup prior to 1800 UTC Saturday you may only operate for 24 consecutive hours of the contest period; otherwise the entire 27 hours is OK.

There are five entry categories: A through E. Class A stations are clubs or groups of more than two people operating at a portable location. Class B stations are one or two person portable entries. Class C is the mobile station category. Class D stations operate from home or other permanent locations using commercial power. Class E stations are the same as D but operating with emergency power.

If you are operating from home using commercial power (Class D) you should only contact other stations in classes A, B, C, and E — no points for other class D stations.

The exchange is real simple: the number of transmitters, the class of operation, and the ARRL section. For example, the HCRA club station W1NY will most likely operate with the exchange 5 A Western Mass. If KA1KPH operates from home using commercial power he would send 1 D Western Mass. And if NC1B was to operate from home using a generator he'd send 1 E Western Mass. If you work a DX station (not Canada) they'll send RS(T) and their QTH.

If you come down and help out at W1NY, or any other Field Day effort, you may not work that station from home for points!

Remember that on each band, the Phone and CW parts count as separate bands! This means that you should work W1NY on both phone and CW on all HF bands. If you like HF packet, RTTY, or ASCII, these contacts count as CW.

Don't forget the bonus points: 100% emergency power; public relations; message origination; message relay; satellite QSO's; natural power; W1AW message; packet radio; and this year the MARS QSO bonus points. These points can significantly enhance your score, and are an important part of the Field Day event.
