

N1RLX Memorial Simplex Net

On January 18 2005, the local emergency simplex net was re-started. This net was started and had been run by Ray N1RLX several years ago. With the passing of Ray in November, Tom, N1MUV, and myself kicked the idea around. It was decided to start the net in January. The net begins on the 146.94 repeater, then moves to 146.42 (or another) simplex frequency.

THE POST OF SERVICE

Our first night, 15 stations checked in. Tom, N1MUV, and Tom, KA1MDA, acted in the capacity of net relay stations. On January 25 there were 9 stations, Tom, N1MUV, was the Relay station.



It was decided to move the Net to Wednesday nights, after the swap net. Our first Wednesday night, 14 stations checked in with Tom, N1MUV and John, $K\times1\times$, operating as relay stations.



With the current world situation, remembering 9/11, the tsunami, and the recent blizzard that effected southern New England, it becomes apparent that emergency communications exercises and practice is warranted.
