Goldfarb Award (by Marty Bowen W1MJB)

This April, the ARRL Foundation Board of Directors voted to award the prestigious William R. Goldfarb Memorial Scholarship to Kyle Ebersold, KB1MNN, of Holland, Massachusetts. Kyle, a senior and honor roll student at Tantasqua Regional High School in Fiskdale, MA will graduate in June with a cumulative GPA of 4.31. In addition to his academic achievements. Kyle has served as Editor-In-Chief of the school newspaper, The Tomahawk, performed with the school's A Capella chamber choir - the Choraleers - and been inducted into the Tri-M Music Honor Society. He plans to attend Bryant University in Smithfield, Rhode Island as a candidate for a Bachelor of Arts degree.

Kyle's interest in amateur radio began in December 2004 when he an SWL radio as a

license as WN1MRA. After hearing his stories, I decided I might find the hobby interesting." said Kyle. This wonderful gift, coupled with stories told by his grandfather John Ebersold, inspired Kyle to study to obtain an amateur radio license. Coincidentally, Kyle's interest in amateur radio rekindled Grandfather John's interest and they both earned their Technician class licenses in August 2005. John Ebersold went on to upgrade to a General class license in October 2005 and Kyle earned his General ticket the following month. "I believe I was one of the last General licensees to need to pass the code requirement as well before that was changed", Kyle said.

Initially Kyle had no radio station of his own, that is until that November when he and his grandfather attended the HCRA auction and



Kyle went home with an Icom 751A. The Icom ,once a prized possession of K1GIU, now a silent key, whose estate bequeathed his radio equipment to the HCRA for

auction, now had a new owner. "The members of the HCRA really helped me the most by allowing me the opportunity to get started as a youth operator through the ICOM I bought at their auction in November 2005. I have attended almost yearly since then and I will never forget the night that I bought the 751A. I remember standing along the side of the room and calmly bidding my way along with two or three other hams until the bids came down to a trickle. I wasn't going to give up by any means though and I was overjoyed when Jim (who I believe was the auctioneer) declared me the winning bidder. That rig was the first physical necessity for me to have for the hobby and it is still the cornerstone of my involvement in ham radio today." Kyle, after a trip with his granddad to Lentinini Communications in Newington, Connecticut for a power supply, antenna tuner, G5RV dipole, a length of coax and various other goodies had the makings for a first class amateur radio station. "I did a lot of rag chewing up until the IARU HF World Championships in July 2006. I decided at that point that I wanted to try contesting and I went all out for it, working all 24 hours of the contest (or more like 22ish seeing how I fell asleep around 6:00 am and woke up around 7:30, a half hour before it ended). I found that contest to be tremendous

fun though and the QSL card influx was amazing. Contests also helped get me really close to my goal of achieving WAS (I just need Alaska now, I got Hawaii in the contest last July!), and I believe I'm one Australian Q50 away from WAC." Kyle also participated in the November sweepstakes, ARRL Field DAY and a number of QSO parties. In addition to contesting, he is an active member of several Amateur Radio organizations, including the ARRL, the Hampden County Radio Association, and FISTS CW Club. That's right folks, Kyle is one of us, a proud member of the Hampden County Radio Association He can be found on the bands operating SSB, CW and PSK31. He is also a young man with dreams and the drive to always let his reach exceed his grasp. "I came to apply for the Goldfarb Scholarship after seeing it for a couple years in QST. I have been a youth ARRL member since 2005 I believe. (I particularly enjoy the unique contesting information that ARRL provides for its members via its web site.) I had always intended to apply for scholarships from the ARRL Foundation and so when I started looking this year for ones to apply for I certainly thought of those as necessary to include as well. When I did apply for them though I thought that I would perhaps get a few of the smaller awards; I never thought that the one unique extra application for the Goldfarb Scholarship would amount to anything in my case". But that extra effort, that extra application did amount to a whole lot "I received an e-mail from Tom Comstock at the Foundation stating that he had a few questions about my application and would like to speak to me and my parents when we were all together. A few days later he did call us but when he spoke to me I vividly remember him saying, "Well, I really don't have any further questions Kyle, I just wanted to be the first to let you know that you are the winner of the Goldfarb award for this year...." I was completely thrilled and at the same time wholesomely taken aback that the Foundation had chosen me as the winner It

was overwhelming because I knew the immense meaning of what winning the Goldfarb award meant for myself as an amateur operator and also how much it would help me and my family be able to afford my attendance at Bryant University next year. My parents were both thrilled as well, and in particular my dad as he has always been the one to look strictly at the financial picture and probability of my future attendance there". So there you have it, local boy make good proving that with hard work and effort does have its own reward in this case, the prestigious ARRL foundation Goldfarb award.

The Goldfarb Scholarship is funded by an endowment from the late William Goldfarb, N2ITP. Prior to his death in 1997, Goldfarb created a scholastic endowment in memory of his parents, Albert and Dorothy Goldfarb. The scholarship, designed to assist the recipient to finance a four-year undergraduate degree in science; engineering, medicine or business, is awarded to one high school senior each year. The candidates for the generous Goldfarb award are required to demonstrate academic excellence, and a significant involvement with Amateur Radio and community service, in addition to financial need. As the seventh Goldfarb Scholarship winner, Kyle will continue the tradition of prior recipients, as having demonstrated superior academic performance, outstanding determination and leadership as well as extraordinary Amateur Radio and community service.

Information on the Goldfarb Scholarship is available on the ARRL Website. The applications process for the Goldfarb Scholarship and other ARRL Foundation Scholarships commences each year on October 1 and concludes the following February 1 for the academic year starting that September.

Rookie Round Up Report

Amateur radio contesting...How can that be any fun? That's the question I would ask myself when I saw an article on the subject. Then, last December, in an effort to get some HF experience I half-heartedly participated in the ARRL 10 meter contest. It was my first time on HF and, mostly due to poor band conditions, I only made a few contacts. It was fun, but I was still pretty timid on the radio. The next month, I participated in the VHF contest while finishing up my Rockmite project

at Jim, KK1W's QTH. I was still a bit timid and while not completely sold on contesting, I found myself becoming obsessed with obtaining "just a few more points" before calling it quits for the evening. Before I knew it, three more hours had passed. Ahh, the hook had sunk a little deeper. Just after the VHF contest. Jim invited me the February Yankee Clippers Contest Club meeting in Sturbridge, MA and that is where I first heard murmurs of the ARRL Rookie Roundup contest.

I have to admit, the term "Rookie Roundup" sounded more like a sports draft event than an amateur radio event. However, the more I heard


and read, the more interested I became. Here are the basics: The contest is geared towards more recently licensed operators to help them develop their operating skills in a structured event. It is also an excellent opportunity for more experienced operators to help mentor the rookies by opening up their typically more evolved stations, as well as provide contacts for the contestants. The rules are simple: the event is one day only and lasts just six hours from 2pm to 8pm. To participate as a rookie you had to be licensed within the last three years (2010, 2009 or 2008). The exchange consisted of your first name, the year you were first

licensed and the state from which you are operating. All HF bands minus WARC were available to use with rookie contact worth one point, non-rookie contacts worth two points and each new state was a multiplier.

At first I was planning to operate at home, but when I heard no one had accepted any of the offers from HCRA non-rookies to use their stations, I took Jim, KK1W up on his offer. I arrived a couple of hours be-

fore the contest started and we worked on tuning the multi-band vertical in the backyard. cool is that? I haven't even started the contest and I'm learning how to tune a multi-band vertical using an antenna analyzer. The day was looking good. As the contest drew near, Jim gave me the run down on the new shack setup. Eric, KB1JVI, also showed up right before the contest to borrow a part from Jim and stayed for a while to show his support. The game plan was to work 20 meters most of the day and then move down to 40 meters for the last couple hours depending on band conditions and then maybe spend a short stint on 80 meters at the end to clean up some of the local states. Two o' clock arrived and it was time to get started. I decided to search

and pounce a bit to warm up. I made a few contacts and then decided to park it and start calling CQ. That was successful and I noticed that I was starting to get awfully busy. PILEUP!!! I'd been spotted on the packet cluster. Callsigns were coming out of the speaker like water pouring over a waterfall. Suddenly two hours were gone from the contest. Things slowed up for a bit and I decided to search and pounce some more. That's when I had a QSO with an operator who I would later find out was some serious competition. Now she might be a rookie and she might be in 4th grade, but don't

let the cute smile fool you, W0ANT (www.qrz.com/db/w0ant) is one serious operator. She had a lot of stations answering her, so I decided to park on a frequency close by and continue calling CQ in hopes that when people were done answering her (or tired of waiting) they would contact me. It seemed to work because the contacts started rolling in again. Suddenly five hours had disappeared and I hadn't moved from the chair. I switched over to 40 meters and then to 80 to pick up a few more multipliers. After everything was said and done I had 68 rookie QSOs, 168 non-rookie QSOs and 42 multipliers for a total score of 12464 putting me in 1st place for the 1st District. There was no official nationwide results, but I can tell you I had the second highest score, right behind...you guessed it...W0ANT!

Overall the contest was a blast. There were a few software glitches with the score reporting on getscores. org, but I'm sure those will all be worked out by the next contest and in the end the organizers were able to circumvent the problem. My operating skills improved dramatically during the contest. I was tonguetied in the beginning, but the second half was much smoother. I also thought the inclusion of the first name in the exchange helped to personalize the contest and although it's obviously not something for a "real" contest, it worked well for an event geared towards new hams. There will be two more Rookie Roundups in 2010—another SSB contest in August and CW in December. Next year RTTY will take over the August SSB contest. I can't begin to tell you how much fun I had. I think the best part was getting my first QSL cards in the mail after the contest with nice notes of congratulations and well wishes in the hobby. I hope all of you—rookies and non-rookies alike try to participate in this fun event later in the year.

IRLP Update by, John, KX1X

After being down for almost a year, and thanks to George, KC1V's donation of a computer, the IRLP node 7270 in South Hadley is back on-theair. I was also able to adjust the audio, and find the ground loop that was causing a loud buzz on the audio output of the node.

The IRLP node is sponsored by the HCRA, but use of the node is open to all licensed amateurs regardless of club affiliation. We encourage the use of the IRLP node, especially with new hams, to get the most out of this great hobby.

The IRLP node listens quietly on 146.460 Mhz (PL 123.0). This is a simplex machine (no repeater offset). Do not 'kerchunk' the node and expect to hear a courtesy tone in response, like you might from a repeater. Please also remember that, even though you are just pushing numbers on your keypad, that you MUST identify these transmissions. Please get into the habit of announcing your callsign before opening the node. The IRLP node also transmits a 123.0hz PL tone, so you can use the TSQ function of your radio with IRLP.

PLEASE NOTE THE NEW PL TONE: 123.0 There is a repeater in NY that listens on 146.46 with PL 114.8, and when there is enhanced propogation the IRLP node interferes with that repeater and vice-versa.

If after setting up your frequency and PL tone, you would like to try a test, and get a response from the IRLP, you can (first identify, then) try pressing *511 which should respond with the time and identify the node.

The antenna is a 2m Ringo Ranger only up 25'. The power is currently set to 25w due to a power supply problem, but if you can hear it, you can work it. The node has good ears to the West/Northwest (Westfield, West Springfield, to Northampton) and East (Ludlow, Palmer, Brimfield).

114TH Boston Marathon Patriots Day April 19 2010

HCRA members join W/MA ARES & MTARA amateur radio operators providing race communications on the route covering 3 miles of the race in Newton.

This year our group provided radio communications for:

- 3 Am.Red Cross First Aid stations.
- 1 joint ARC & federal Disaster Assistance Team station
- 3 water stops.

Departing from Palmer @ 6:00 am Our group of hams carpooled to a very early meeting in Newton. Proceeded to stations Checking into assigned repeaters' Some 12 repeaters where in use throughout the race from Hopkington to Boston.

ARC First Aid stations are assigned three operators One each assigned to "away teams" Team responds to reports of runners or spectators in need of medical assistance.

Each team assigned a radio operator to the station mgr.to maintain a link to away teams and net control Amateur radio Communications also used to call for an ambulance or additional medical assistance when required. Operators @ water stops act as eyes on the race looking for runners in need of help as well as any logistical messages the station may request sent. In most cases HT's with extended antennas are suitable for reaching repeaters in your area with a clear signal. Extra batteries A must .Extra HT a good idea

Weather was nearly ideal for runners 50 55 dg. Not bad for volunteers. The need for medical assistance was light compared to other years. However a number of runners & spectators required hospital care.

That's the work, well appreciated by the runners.


The fun is being a witness to 26000 souls /soles running by your location.
