### OSL OUTGOING BUREAU

Last month we explained how the incoming QSL bureau worked. Well, the HCRA doesn't run the outgoing section, but you can very easily get it done by the ARRL. As a membership service, all you have to do is put the call sign of the station your sending it to in block letters on the card, wrap them in the OST brown wrapper, enclose a dollar, and send them into the League. Please alphabetize them by first letter, i.e. HA9ZT, HB5TR, I6RTG, etc.Do NOT put rubber bands, or other clips around the cards. It just slows them down. The October 1976 OST lists the countries that cards can be sent to. The address at the league is:

#### REPEATER EMERGENCIES

The ARRL has recomended that we hams avoid the use of "break, break, break" on repeaters. However, what should we use in its stead? "MAYDAY," recognized by international treaty, is only suitable in situations where an immediate threat exists to life or property. Most hams do not know the word for the next level of emergency, which is "PAN". Therefore, this would be a poor choice. The third internationally recognized emergency word is "SECURITY". This would also not be understood by most hams, so would be another poor choice.

I would like to suggest the following trilogy. "MAYDAY" for immediate threats to life or property. An example would be a house on fire. "Priority" for a situation that requires an immediate response, but does not involve an immediate threat to life or property. An example would be a traffic accident where no one has been injured.

"EMERGENCY" would be a situation that requires assistance. example would be calling a tow truck when your car breaksd down.

These words used on a busy repeater would get you the attention that you need. "Break, break, break" lacks professionalism. "Priority" is a quick word that you should be able to squeak in between even the fastest button pushers! (A pause after it has been turned over to you should be S.O.P. on all repeaters.)

As a final thought, when you send a distress call, i.e. "Mayday, Mayday, Mayday". it must be followed by the distress message...
"I am declaring an emergency...Our position is... We require, etc..."
By international treaty, all stations should give you the frequency when you follow this format. A word to the wise: If you hear a "MAYDAY" or other emergency call, and then find out that the "emergency" is something dumb, like the guy backed his truck into a tree, you still give that station the frequency until it is declared over. You still give that station the frequency, until it is declared over . You can lose your license for making comments like "That's no emergency, etc" YOU ARE INTERFERING WITH DISTRESS TRAFFIC! It is NOT up to you to decide what an emergency is. Wait until it is all over to make your comments to the dummy.

With a two minute "time out" on most repeaters, someone can be kept waiting a long time if a windbag has the machine. Try to learn to pause to see if someone requires the machine more than you do. Stand by in an emergency if you can not be of assistance.


