

CIVIL PREPAREDNESS:

Part II. Surviving a Nuclear Attack

This is the second of four parts. It is intended to get you interested in digging deeper into the subject. Comments are welcomed.

One of the problems with preparing for the ultimate disaster of the type I magnitude is the popularly held false ideas like "No one will survive", or "Who would want to live in hell that would be left afterwards?". Let me emphatically state that this is pure bull. A properly constructed blast shelter will shield you and your family even if a 5 megaton bomb went off 1.5 miles away! While it is true that in the world after a nuclear war you would have new perils and hazards, these can be overcome by using your wits. Half the population of England and almost half of France's was carried off during the "Black Death" of the 15th century. But their countries endured! Americans have always met challenges from indians to the Civil War. What will be needed the most is the faith and desire to persevere!

Fallout and blast shelters are now blase and most of the public has an ostrich's approach to the danger. All out nuclear war will not appear suddenly, but will be preceded by a period of worsening international relationships. Even if you did not get a few weeks or days warning, no enemy can attack us without at least a 15 minute warning. The first attacks

would be directed against military targets. So, unless you built your home on top of a Minuteman Silo, you should still have time to prepare. It is not our intention to tell you all you need to know, just to spark your interest enough to get some CD pamphlets or library books and expand your knowledge.

Let's look at a possible scenario:
with a sickening week of rising international tensions caused by (fill in the blank) the President has just come on the air urging civil defense preparations.
The wife joins the run on the supermarket to stockpile more food. You begin to shovel 3 feet of dirt against celler walls and windows. Filling every container with water, you pile food and water in the best corner of the basement. On the floor

above you pile dirt at least 12" deep and pile furniture, etc on top of that. All shutters and drapes are closed to prevent damage from breaking glass. The gas pilot lights have been turned off and other fire hazards shut down.

The radio informs you that an enemy attack is imminent against our country. Gathering your family together, you all sit under a makeshift shelter in the best celler corner. The ground shakes and you realize that they have hit Westover Air Force Base 25 miles away. The brilliant flash of light is followed by a pressure wave of 15 psi that breaks every window in your home and severely damages it. The heat wave is limited because today was an overcast day. Within hour the radioactive fallout will begin. You're shielded enough because of your preparations to survive. A two week stay will be required in your shelter, with only short trips out for supplies. Has the nation survived?

ZB OCTOBER

As a ham operator, you'll be expected to provide a vital link for rescue and restoration of the nation. When New York City went, so did the phone system. The plans of the Federal Government right now expect the local community to carry on for two weeks before food and other supplies are brought in. Realism says that a period of 4-6 weeks would be more like it. Many things will need to be taken care of. The vital role ham radio can play is in letting the people know that the national government is still there and that the nation lives.

Next month we will cover other types of Type I disasters. If you'd like more information on this subject, contact your local civil defense official, or visit the library.

It started with my attempt to assemble a Heathkit SB-220 linear amplifier only to finish it and find out that it did not work. No less than six fellow hams offered their time and assistance. Tune up on 10 meters and hear Qso's of friends cheering up their fellow hams who've had a stay in the hospital. These things remind me of the true meaning of ham radio-the development of the unselfish and caring relationship we call "friendship".

I will look forward to seeing all of you at the auction. Your board works hard to make these meetings instructive and entertaining. Of course our main benefit is in the eyeball Qso's with our fellow hams.
