DX Clips

I have written this column for several years and have come to Realize that there is a limited amount of data and information to pass on. One can editorialize on sensitive issues in the DX

community; but, that approach is highly opinionated and contentious. Most of you already know my feelings on DXCC matters at this stage, and I have touched on "elitism" in the past. There is no room for "elitism" in this Hobby - at any level! We need every Radio Amateur we can get. The latest group to get "bashed" by the "elite critics" are the newly licensed Extra class. I have heard denigrating comments locally and on the Bands. The 5 WPM Code test is obviously much easier than $20\mbox{WPM}$, but it cannot be logically argued that those Amateurs are lless intelligent than those o us who passed at 20. It is simply a matter of motivation. We have simply created interest to upgrade in a group of Amateurs who previously did not possess the desire to learn higher speed Code for the additional privileges thereby granted. If one analyzes Morse Code use by prominent DXers (on the Internet) it is apparent that the majority significantly favor SSB. In fact, many solely operate SSB and reserve CW for instances where "rare" DX is only available via CW. One need only visit the DXpedition Websites and enter the Callsigns of well-known DXers to draw this conclusion. On the other hand, there are a few who clearly prefer CW and work very few on SSB or other Digital Modes. None of this is important - it is simply a matter of choice. I believe that CW usage has dropped considerably in recent years. My sense is that one of the major reasons for this fall-off is that many have lost their CW proficiency. Use it or lose it!! Have we actually enhanced potential CW operation by adding these new Extra Class Hams? I would not be surprised to see a positive "Blip" on the usage graph.

I believe that we have provided incentive to many who were bored with their "niche" in the Hobby. Hopefully , they will operate more on the HF Bands which have suffered from lack of use for years. It scares me to observe the inactivity at the peak of the Sunspot Cycle. At times it seems that the DX outnumbers US Hams on the popular HF Bands. If this trend continues , we have a serious risk of losing some of our HF allocations.

Let us recognize and congratulate the new Extras among us. I personally hope many get "bitten by the DX Buq" - we will all profit by their ACTIVE presence.

We are now moving from Spring toward Summer Propagation conditions. Ten Meters is not as useful as it was in late March or early April. Longer daylight hours in the Northern Hemisphere heat the Ionosphere and it thins with a resultant lower Maximum Useable Frequency (MUF) during the daylight hours. 15 Meters is still quite good, especially into areas that are dark. 20Meter nighttime openings will become more common as the days get longer.

New DXpeditions are planned for the coming months, and I will report on them as firm information becomes available.

Enjoy the Summer and the great outdoor activity opportunities, but attempt to allot some of your time to operating - we need you.

First Stop: National Weather Service

WHERE: We start with a 35 minute sound-and-picture show in the conference room. This show explains who we are, what operations occur at the Forecast Office, and how forecasts are prepared and sent. We then take a few minutes to answer any questions the audience may have. The participants then view our operations area; here, they see the various computer systems that we use to view satellite, radar, and computer forecast model data...as well as the systems we use to prepare and send forecasts and warnings.

HOW LONG: A typical tour takes 60 minutes. If there are a lot of questions, the tour length could go longer.

Time permitting, they will then walk through our "Weather Gallery". This has pictures from extreme New England weather of the past 60+ years.

Over 2500 people have toured our office during the past 3 years.

Second Stop: Lunch

We will be stopping somewhere for lunch. You are responsible for any costs for lunch as they are not included with the trip fee.

Third Stop: New England Wireless

and Steam Museum

The New England Wireless and Steam Museum is an electrical and mechanical engineering museum emphasizing the beginnings of radio and steam power. The museum honors engineers who achieved greatness and served the public good by analyzing and solving tough engineering problems.

In 1875 Rhode Island was the world center of the stationary steam industry. According to the American Society of Mechanical Engineers (ASME) the New England Wireless and Steam Museum has the finest collection of Rhode Island made engines, together with the finest collection of original stationary steam engine drawings.

This museum preserves the original Massie coastal wireless station which was moved from Point Judith, Rhode Island. This station, built in 1907 to communicate with marine shipping, is the oldest surviving, originally equipped wireless station anywhere. It symbolizes the very start of the electronics industry - a Plymouth Rock of the radio, TV, cellphone, satcom, Internet, computer, CATscan and all the other marvelous creations of electrical engineering. The significance of the Massie station is enormous.

The museum's assembly hall is an 1822 neo-classic New England meeting house which, like the Massie station, was moved here to be saved from demolition. This charming building is available for weddings, christenings, club functions, corporate presentations, etc.

The museum shows rare early radio and steam apparatus - much in working order.



Cost per person: \$27 - this includes admission to the museum. The NWS is free.

Personal Lightning Safety Tips de Eric, N1QK0

A reminder that hurricane season started June 1 and goes thru November.

1. Plan in advance your evacuation and safety measures. When you first see lightning or hear thunder, go to a building or a vehicle. Lightning often precedes rain , so don't wait for the rain to begin before suspending activities.

2. IF OUTDOORS...Avoid water. Avoid the high ground. Avoid open spaces. Avoid all metal objects including electric wires, fences, machinery, motors power tools, etc. Unsafe places include underneath canopies, small picnic or rain shelters, or near trees. When possible, find shelter in a substantial building or in a fully enclosed metal vehicle such as a car, truck, or a van with windows completely shut. If lightning is striking nearby when you are outside, you should:

- A: Crouch down. Put feet together. Place hands over ears to minimize hearing damage from thunder.
- B: Avoid proximity (minimum of 15ft.) to other people.
- 3. IF INDOORS... Avoid water. Stay away from doors and windows. Do not use the telephone. Take off head sets. Turn off, unplug, and stay away from appliances, computers, power tools, & TV sets. Lightning may strike exterior electric and phone lines, inducing shocks to inside equipment.
- 4. SUSPEND ACTIVITIES for 30 minutes after the last observed lightning or thunder.
- 5. INJURED PERSONS do not carry an electric charge and can be handled safely. Apply First Aid procedures to a lightning victim if you are qualified to do so. Call 911 or send for help immediately.

KK1W's Notes on The Dayton Hamvention

One of the good things about working at the same place for almost 20 years is a lot of vacation time. With a new policy of "use it or lose it" in place this year, I made a quick decision to take some time and attend the Dayton Hamvention. This is the hamfest of all hamfests, the mother lode, or so it's written in all the magazines. Guess it was time to see for myself.

I decided to drive, although airfares were reasonable. I planned a few stops at some neat railroad spots in PA to help make the drive more enjoyable. Actually, the drive was not bad at all, and the straight drive back on Monday took about 13½ hours, including two fuel stops and a light lunch. A "day trip" as we call it around here!

I got to Dayton about 1:00 PM on Friday, just in time for the rain to start falling. Most of the flea market was set up, and everybody was pulling out the tarps to cover up the stuff. That made up my mind, time to do the inside booths today!

The HARA arena is a large convention center, but spread into four different halls. It was busy inside, but not super crowded. I got a chance to walk most of the halls, talk with some of the vendors I had on my list to check out, and make a few purchases. Speaking of purchases, this is the place to go if you are contemplating new rigs. The price wars between the vendors are extreme. For example, the Yaesu 817 was going for \$639, the Yaesu VX5R was \$269, Yaesu FT1000 MkV was \$2399 and an Icom IC706IIG for under \$800. You could easily cover the cost of your trip with the savings from these deals. Unfortunately (or fortunately, it all depends on your view!) I only bought some accessories and didn't manage to save the cost of my trip – oh well, maybe next year! If you really want to see and chat with just about every conceivable manufacturer of ham gear, this is the place to go.

Saturday dawned gloomy, but at least not raining. I made up my mind to walk the entire flea market before going back into the exhibit hall and it was a good thing I did. I don't know how many vendors there were outside, but it took me over four hours to walk the entire flea market just once. The selection was amazing. If you wanted something that was ever made, it was probably there. The pile of "free" stuff was larger than some local hamfests I've seen. Again, like the inside vendors, come prepared with your needs and you probably won't go home disappointed. Shop carefully though, the price disparity is much larger than the inside vendors. You could easily buy the same used boat anchor for either \$100 or \$450 if you weren't careful. Absolutely amazing, that about sums up the flea market in two words.

I went back for more on Sunday; the hamfest ends at 1:00 PM on that day. That's the best day for bargains, but not the best for selection. A lot of outside vendors went home Saturday evening, and many started packing early Sunday. The same for the inside, many exhibitors were packing up at noon. Still, a great time to cruise the flea for any last minute markdowns. Combine the bargain hunting with perfect weather and it made for a nice Sunday morning.
