ARES NET UPDATE

WMA ARES Nets & More by Smitty, KCIIKA, ASEC Net Manager

What do YOU want to do with your license?

As amateur radio operators, we can choose from many different aspects of ham radio. Contesting, EmComm, NTS, POTA, SOTA, voice (SSB), QRP, EME, digital modes, CW, NVIS, DX, kit building, rag chewing, etc., etc., etc.

For the newer hams or those that haven't heard of all of these, the following is a very brief description.

Contesting, operating radios to get points in various contests. Can be combined with many other choices, such as **QRP** contests, voice or **SSB** contests, **CW** contests, **DX** contests, etc.



EmComm, emergency communications This can be ARES, RACES, NTS, CERT, Skywarn, SATERN, MARS, etc. These groups, some of which you can just volunteer for and some of which you must be appointed to, deal with emergency communications. Some of them can be classified as served agencies, such as MARS, CERT, Skywarn, and SATERN. Most of these groups are listed at ARRL.ORG under Public Service.

NTS, or National Traffic System, is part of **EmComm** but should be highlighted separately. The ham operators who specialize in NTS are sending Radiograms, what used to be referred to as Telegrams. They are extremely helpful in emergency situations and are a very specialized, highly trained group. Radiograms typically have up to 25 words and can be of routine, priority, welfare, or emergency precedence. The Precedence determines how quickly and what priority they have going through the system. These messages can go from the local level to a regional level to a national level and back down again, so they need to be transmitted very accurately with no room for error or confusion. That's why there is a 600+ page manual to work with a 25-word document.

POTA can stand for Parks On The Air, Peaks On The Air, Portables On The Air. These are groups that are also under **contesting** and can also be under **DX** or **QRP** as well as **SSB** or **CW**. The operators get points for contacting other like operators. SOTA is also a part of this group and can stand for Summits On The Air or Students On The Air.

Voice, or **SSB**, is when you communicate with other hams by talking. This can be done using low-power **QRP**, locally **NVIS**, over longer distances **DX**, and on **HF**, **VHF**, or **UHF**. You can also talk to someone by bouncing your signal off the moon and back, **EME**, or through satellites in orbit.

Digital modes are communications where the radio signal is converted into a digital signal versus an analog signal. The digital signal typically uses less bandwidth and lower power than voice or SSB. This means that you can communicate further, more efficiently.

There are digital voice modes such as **DMR**, **DStar**, **NXDN**, **EchoLink**, and purely digital modes such as **FT8**, **Winlink**, **VaraAC**, etc. Some you need a computer to connect to your radio so someone on the other end can connect their radio to a computer and you can exchange messages.

CW is the original digital mode and uses Morse Code to send and receive messages. This is a very efficient way to send and receive and can reach long distances with low power and poor conditions.

Rag Chewing is just getting on the air and chatting with someone. No points, no contest, just talking about anything you choose.

Kit building and experimenting with equipment or antennas is the foundation of what this hobby was built on. Learning and innovating. One can also spend their time sharing the knowledge they have. You don't have to know everything to be able to help someone. You just need to know something they don't. You could be a brand-new ham and help someone who has been in the hobby for decades. It's all about sharing knowledge.

This is a partial list of some of the choices you have as a ham. You can explore as many, or as few as you like. I knew from the beginning I wanted to be involved in EmComm. My main purpose is to stay on the air no matter what happens to the internet, phone system, power grid, or other forms of communication and relay information as needed to whatever served agency needs help.

This club is very good at sharing many aspects of amateur radio and has a wealth of knowledge available. You just need to pick a path and ask for help. You don't have to stay on that path forever; try it for a while, then try another path. It's all good.

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PORTABLE HAM RADIO by John, N1JIE

What Exactly is Portable Radio Operation?



So, May is portable radio month. What exactly is portable radio operation? Basically, it's not exactly anything—it is pretty much any radio operation that is not mobile or base station. Mobile is operating in a vehicle (plane, car, boat, etc), and base is a station that is more or less permanent—in a building, with a fixed antenna (fixed is a fluid term; HOA residents sometimes have to setup/takedown for each use). So it is actually the most wide-open category in ham radio.

The big HCRA Field Day station, with a generator, computers, jack-up towers with Tri-banders on top yup, that's portable. How about the 3w mountain topper with an EFHW wire and a mini key? Yup, portable. That HT you got when you passed your tech? Yup, portable.

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PORTABLE HAM RADIO CONT'D

What Exactly is Portable Radio Operation?

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Like the real estate lady says, "it's location, location, location". My first portable operation was with my base radio (FTdx-1200) and a homebrew coiled dipole next to the frozen pond in Easthampton. 100w, a borrowed Bioenno battery, and made contact with South Africa. (This is where Harold, N1FTP laughs and says, "and he danced and screamed like a little girl"). The next year was on Hampton Pond with my FT-857 @100w, my EFRW antenna, my Bioenno, and Winter Field Day on ice. Much more portable, but still bulky. But this has been my basic POTA rig for the last 2 years. It just about all fits into a backpack at about 28 lb. Not hiking any mountains with that. Newest setup is smaller, lower power (QRP - 5/10w), and is geared more towards SOTA / hiking access. X6100, EFrw (Tufteln kit), tiny tablet, 3ah battery, all in a backpack weighing about 10 lbs. I've already hiked a SOTA and gotten an activation.

The important thing to remember, as with all amateur radio activities, is: what do YOU want to do? There are all kinds of things and all levels of ability. Have difficulty getting around? Setting up at or near your vehicle with the antenna nearby is a great way to activate a POTA. There are a couple of Summits you can drive right up to near the top. Get someone to go with you to help. Many POTA activations are multi-ops. It can be a great way to involve kids—let them help set up and carry stuff and be there for the activity. You can go in your backyard and practice. Or be portable in the backyard. Want to be more active? There are tons of options.

There are just a few basic components needed. A transceiver, a power supply, and an antenna. Kinda like a fire, you need air, fuel, and heat. You can go top-line at the altar of Elekraft or shop at hamfests for older, used rigs that will do the job. Antennas are the same: end-fed wire, dipole, vertical, hamstick—all will work. Power supplies—options are all over. Lead acid, LIFePO, NiCAD... There are also solar and generators.

There is NO "right or wrong" way to be portable. We had a great meeting this month. With 10+ hams showing off their portable equipment, a wide range of equipment, and lots of options.

There are a ton of resources on the internet. Several Facebook groups are devoted to portable, POTA / QRP lots of YouTube channels are devoted to the various portable events. Field Day is the world's portable event. If you haven't been to the HCRA Field Day site, it is an amazing team event with a minimum of 3 radios, going all night long, lots of on-air practice, and lots of people to learn from. It was one of the most intense events I participated in, and I went home tired and hoarse. Tons of fun!

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Parks On The Air: You can be a hunter or an activator, but you have to register first. If you have ever had a POTA contact from home, they will show up on your hunter log once you sign up. Lots of information, lots of "wallpaper" available. POTA contacts are some of the most fun I've had - very patient, will spend a couple of minutes to pull in a weak contact, willing to have a bit of chat rather than just a contest contact. It was started in 2016 after a National Park event with Ham Radio.





Summits On The Air: This is from Great Britain. Again, you have to register first. It's a bit more complicated, and it generally involves a hike, but there are lots of options. Jim, KK1W, and Frandy, N1FJ, are big SOTA guys and know a lot about remote portable operations.



Winter Field Day: This is an event somewhat like the ARRL Field Day but in the winter. I like to play that one because I like the challenge. Playing the bonus points is fun (battery, outdoors, in a public place, etc., like the ARRL Field Day).

New England Ham Radios for Sale: This is a Facebook group that has lots of used gear. There is usually a guy in Belchertown with several listings, and you can always find something to get interested in.

QRP Guys: This is a kit site for low power (QRP - 5/10w). It's amazing what you can do with low power. The antenna (and location) are the key.

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QRP Labs: Another QRP kit site

uSDX: Another QRP kit / built radio. There were a couple at the meeting, and their owners were happy with them.

Full-power portable radios are also available; Yaesu, Icom, Elekraft all have great rigs; some are available used. Ebay, hamfests, and club members are good sources for used gear.

So, set your limits for budget, how remote you want to be, and what you want to accomplish. There are several of us in the HCRA that enjoy portable operations and can help. Go to Field Day with the club at least once. The experience will get you out of the basement, and get you started!

I've heard people joke that it is an expensive hobby, but it isn't any worse than golf, boating, skiing, or any other activity that uses equipment. And like those mentioned, we can also have a ton of fun outdoors!

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VINTAGE RADIO MUSEUM

New & Improved Shack at the Vintage Radio & Communications Museum

Under the leadership of Bob Allison, WB1GCM, president of the Amateur Radio Club at the Vintage Radio and Communication Museum of Connecticut (VCRMCT), the Ham Shack at the museum has been upgraded and has become an even more attractive place to visit. As someone who cares deeply about the future of our hobby, Bob's goal is to spearhead the improvements so that it can facilitate the club's mission of being "Ambassadors for Ham Radio."

The first thing a visitor sees as he or she approaches the Ham Shack is a Gates Model BC-IT transmitter for use with amplitude modulation (AM) transmissions. The transmitter, standing about seven feet tall and several feet wide, is larger than a refrigerator and first saw service with a Country Music station in Arizona. It was acquired by the museum several years ago and lent to the ARRL, where Bob Allison, acting as project coordinator, was among a group who restored it a couple of years ago. According to Bob Allison, "Museum staff, led by Dan Thomas, NC1J, restored the Gates transmitter to "broadcast" condition. Tim Smith, WA1HLR, modified the Gates transmitter to operate on 75 and 160 meters. Other hams volunteered their time, equipment, and knowledge to perfect the transmitted audio; Steve Cloutier, WA1QIX, and Dan Brown, W1DAN, in particular. The transmitter was recently returned and installed at the museum. The Gates is capable of about 1 kilowatt of output. The club has been using the transmitter for special events, as operating with high utility rates can be extremely expensive.

New & Improved Shack at the Vintage Radio & Communications Museum

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As one enters the shack, the one item to catch a visitor's eye would likely be the large monitor linked to an SDRplay RSP1 Software Defined Ra-

dio (SDR). The display allows visitors to see and understand more about the RF spectrum.

The equipment array now in use at the shack includes a Collins 32V3 transmitter (circa 1950), which is rated at about 150 watts PA Plate power input in CW mode or 120 watts on phone. It covers the 80, 40, 20, 15, 11, and 10-meter bands. Matched with this transmitter is the Collins 75A1 Receiver (circa 1947 and later), which introduced new features that had not been available in amateur



radio receivers before its production. True "Boat Anchors", these radios together weigh over 100 pounds!

The club uses this Collins gear primarily for AM operation, which is very popular with it's members.

Modern solid-state gear at the club station is first represented by a Yaesu FTDX-5000, which was donated last year. The FTdx-5000 offers 200 watts of output in CW or SSB (PEP) and is very useful for demonstrations for guests at the museum; schoolchildren have been thrilled to speak over the air and hear a response from a Ham in another state or country. Next to this radio is a Kenwood TS -570D HF transceiver (first introduced over 25 years ago), which offers good au-

dio and is easy to operate; at the club, it is often used for SSB contacts. Next to that is a Kenwood TS-140S HF transceiver dating from about 1987, which is being used for CW operation.

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VINTAGE RADIO MUSEUM CONT'D

New & Improved Shack at the Vintage Radio & Communications Museum

Rounding out the operating section of the shack is a Heathkit DX-60 AM/CW crystal-controlled transmitter (circa 1965) that was originally sold in kit form and was very popular among Novice licensees 50 years ago. This DX-60 is used with a Heathkit HG-10 VFO and a Heathkit SB-610 Station Monitor Scope. Paired with the DX-60 is a National Model HRO-50-R1 Short Wave Receiver (circa 1951), which weighs nearly 100 pounds and has plug-in coils to change bands. This gear is used to operate CW and AM by club members, and all of the vintage equipment is maintained primarily by Larry Bearse, WA1LGQ.

The station also has a Collins 75A-4 Receiver and KWS-1 Transmitter that are in the process of being repaired. Additionally, the club has added two new dipole antennas, one for 80m and the other for 40m. which is also performing well on 15m. Soon, the club will restore its Triband beam and add a Hustler 6BTV vertical.

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Though not part of the station, one thing that is interesting to see displayed just outside of the shack is equipment from the old tuning station for WTIC which was featured in a QST article in 1929. The acquisition of the coil and large plate condenser was facilitated by club members who transported it to the museum.

So, this summer, a really fun way to spend an afternoon would be to schedule a trip to visit The Vintage Radio and Communications Museum at 115 Pierson Lane in Windsor, Connecticut 06095, not only to see the interesting display of vintage equipment but also to operate the station of the Ham Club there.

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SKYWARN REPORTING

What, When, and How to Report!



After you take and pass your Skywarn class, how do you report severe weather?

The first thing you need to remember from the class is the two words "reportable criteria." Most of the time on Skywarn nets, we are looking for Reportable Criteria. If you don't remember what is considered reportable criteria, you can check the back of your Skywarn I.D. card as shown on the next page.



Sometimes we are just looking for specific information on the nets. Listen to what the net control station is requesting and respond accordingly.

If you need to make a report and there is no one running a net, you can call the number listed on your card to report in with your callsign, name, spotter I.D., and your report. Be sure it is something listed on the back of the card.

Sometimes we get reports that it is raining hard and there is a lot of thunder and lightning. This is not reportable criteria and can tie up a repeater or phone number, preventing someone else from reporting appropriate criteria.

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SKYWARN REPORTING CONT'D

What, When, and How to Report!

Typically, if there is pending severe weather in the forecast, I am monitoring a special Skywarn chat group well before the weather arrives. The members of the group have decades of experience dealing with severe weather and access to resources that they start checking days in advance. I monitor the conversations in the group and sometimes will contact my Skywarn net control stations to see who may be available for nets.

By doing this before the group is ready to request coverage on the repeaters, I can respond immediately to their request. There have been quite a few storms lately that could develop or fade out, and sometimes we don't know until just before they get here. The group I listen to has direct contact with the Boston NWS and takes into account the advisories, watches, and warnings from NWS before requesting Skywarn to activate and get on the air. Well, most of the time. As we all know, weather forecasting is not an exact science, so sometimes we activate before a watch or warning is issued. If we get enough reports from the field, we can actually provide the final information the NWS needs to put out a watch or warning.

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Please Report these conditions:
Tornadoes / Funnel Clouds (be wary of look-alikes)
Wall Clouds, especially if they are rotating
1/8+" Hail (BE SPECIFIC on size/diameter) (Severe =1+")
Winds 40 mph or greater (Severe = 58+ mph)
Damaging winds; Trees/Power Lines down ; Damage to Buildings
Rainfall ... 1" per hour ; 2+" storm total
ANY Flooding (Streams/Rivers, Coastal); 6+" deep on streets
Winter Weather Extras

As mentioned in last month's article, Skywarn is one of the few emergency groups that it's okay to selfactivate. There have been many times I have been at home, enjoying dinner with my wife, while monitoring the chat group, and I just know they are going to text me: Smitty, can you get on the 94 and call out for reports? At that point, I can be on the air in about a minute and start requesting criteria reports on 146.940. If you are always ready, you don't have to get ready.

You don't have to be an official Skywarn Spotter to call into the nets, but you should be aware of what we are looking for when we request Reportable Criteria. As soon as the net is over, the other net controllers and I type up a report and send it to the chat group so they can relay a summary to the Boston NWS office. The biggest thing is to listen to what the net control station is asking for and in what order we are filling out a log sheet, and try not to give a lot of extra information. If there is a severe thunderstorm and we are asking for hail reports, we don't need to know the temperature, dewpoint, barometric pressure, or humidity. That information just ties up the net and delays us getting the report typed and sent in. If we ask for hail reports and you have wind 40 mph or greater with trees down, a suspected wall cloud, or a tornado, that would be really good to include in your report.

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VOLUNTEERS ON THE AIR UPDATE!

ARRL's VOTA Operating Event Continues!

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ARRL's yearlong operating event, Volunteers On the Air, or VOTA, began January 1, 2023. The event is organized as part of ARRL's 2023 theme, "Year of the Volunteers," which recognizes the contributions of ARRL member volunteers, and offers opportunities to become more active and involved in amateur radio and ARRL.

VOTA encourages participants to make contacts with ARRL members and volunteers, earning points for each contact. Point values have been assigned (see the Points Table at <u>vota.arrl.org</u>). All scoring is automatically calculated through ARRL's Logbook of The World (LoTW, <u>https://www.arrl.org/logbook-of-the-world</u>). If you are already a LoTW user, continue uploading your QSOs to participate. If you're a new LoTW user, visit Getting Started with LoTW.



As part of the event, there will be week-long activations by W1AW portable stations operating in all US states and territories. W1AW/#

portable operations are worth 5 points for each contact, and they can be contacted on all bands and modes. There's also an opportunity to earn the W1AW Worked All States Award. There will be two week-long W1AW operations from each of the 50 states.

Only two-way contacts qualify for points (cross-band, cross-mode, and repeater contacts are not valid), using any mode (CW, phone, or digital) - including EME and satellite operations - on 160, 80, 40, 20, 15, 10, 6, 2, and 1.25 meters, as well as 70 centimeters, VHF/UHF/SHF, and microwave bands available to US amateurs above 2 meters (2190-, 630-, 60-, 30-, 17-, and 12-meter band contacts are not counted for credit in this event).

If you didn't work W1AW/1 between April 12th and 18th don't worry as there is another week of Massachusetts operations in the Fall.

Every volunteer is given a point value as is every member. You can't add up your points if for example, Larry, a life ARRL member, field volunteer, affiliated club president. He will be assigned the highest point value for one of those and that's what working Larry is worth. Working Larry gives the maximum points.

Anyone who works Larry, W1AST will get 30 points as he is the WMA Affiliated Club Coordinator!
