



Speaking of Building

There is still a lot of fun to be had

ardly a day goes by that I don't hear someone lamenting on the local repeaters that, "no one builds anything anymore" or "with the advances in IC's and miniaturization the average ham can't construct anything". And in some ways they are right, probably not because it can't be done, but because it's just not as economical as it used to be. Back in the 50's and 60's, when just a transmitter cost better than a weeks pay and surplus gear could be had for next to nothing you really could save big bucks. Back then household appliances cost so much people actually 'repaired' them instead of replacing them! Can you believe that?

Well, it's still possible to build stuff, but it takes a different form. Now-adays it usually involves small custom applications built around a PIC (custom programmed microprocessor) or putting together building blocks of off the shelf, but discontinued items.

Lately I've been experimenting with making some inexpensive APRS trackers. These are little devices that you can put in your car, attach to a hiker, stuff like that and then watch their progress on a radio and computer receiving APRS. You can even view them on the internet without a radio at http://www.findu.com! Complicated project, you bet it would be if I had to design the transmitter, the GPS interface and the GPS receiver too. And probably a bit out of my price range. But (there always is a but, isn't there?) eBay and Byonics to the rescue. Byonics (www.byonics.com) makes a neat "Pocket Tracker" kit for under \$100. It's a 2 meter transmitter and GPS interface that fits in an Altoid tin. On eBay it's possible to get a complete GPS receiver for \$25, and a good one at that. Made for OEM applications all you need to do is put 5V and an antenna and it's outputting NEMA data to your Byonics tracker. Cool stuff, you build it yourself, and you get something that would cost far more than \$150 to purchase off the shelf. See, building is possible and is keeping with the old adage of the "frugal ham"!

So what's your project going to be this year. Why not make a late New Year's resolution to complete a project in time for next year's "Show & Tell"? March 2006 is less than a year away!

It ends Sunday morning at 1:00AM, then begins again at 9:00 AM running until 8:00 PM Sunday evening (all times given are local, EDT time). Top Ten Reasons to Operate the NEQP

- 10. For a lot of U.S. Hams, New England is halfway to Europe, and in the right direction, so you can try out your new European stacks and Beverages.
- **9.** If you're a W1 operating fro your home, it's just like a DX contests where you only have to push F1 all weekend and run guys. The multipliers will come to you.
- **8.** Tell a mobile in Vermont or Rhode Island how loud he is and butter him up so you can get the mult in SS.
- 7. The W1 big guns going mobile will have a chance to see how it feels to be weak for a change. And if you're in Europe, you can hear what weak W1's sound like.
- **6.** You can try to figure out why there are Windham counties in Connecticut and Vermont, but not New Hampshire, where Windham is just a town. You can ask every station you work in Rockingham County, NH, if the hams there are really rocking. (note—the aforementioned Windham, NH is in Rockingham County).
- 5. If your call is K3WW, it's yet another contest for you to enter! (K3WW operated 52 different contests in 2001)
- 4. Since the exchange is the first 3 letters of the county and the two-letter state abbreviation, this opens up all kinds of opportunities. Ask W1UF if he knows a limerick that starts with "There was a young miss from Nantucket...". Ask a mobile to drive from Washington County, VT to Washington County, ME to Washington County, RI so you can get your WAWC award. Be thankful there's no Eaton County in Maine.
- 3. It's going to rain next weekend, so you won't be able to do antenna work anyway.

For the past year, I have only been able to attend my local club meetings only a couple of times but last week I managed to make a meeting. We were discussing plans for Field Day, and before we were through I was a little perturbed. I thought, from the discussion, we were going to be operating in some contest. Field Day has never been a contest and for the life of me I don't know when it changed from an emergency exercise. It has always a means of demonstrating to the public and government that we could go into the field and set up and maintain an amateur radio station. This week I pondered how this problem could be fixed. FD operation has got to the point that you only have to type the call sign into a computer and the computer sends the report. Usually at a speed far above what the operator can copy but let's face it, you only have to copy a combination of six letters and numbers to be successful.

(HCRA Member) N1FJ's Reply to the WMA SM's Monthly News

Bill, W1UD:

 $\ensuremath{\text{I'm}}$ writing to you in response to your Western Massachusetts Section News that I just received.

I hear what you're saying about Field Day, but I don't think the contest aspect of it is such a problem. I don't think it's a problem to be "fixed".

There's a picture of me (at the Field Day operating position of the Crete (Nebraska) Amateur Radio Club) in the Field Day article in December 1952 QST. Since then, for me, Field Day has always represented what is best and most fun about ham radio. It's not just a demonstration of emergency preparedness. Without the competition aspect of it I don't think it would be so successful -- or as much fun.

Setting up: camping, cooking, erecting towers, stringing antennas, solar panels, generators. Sharing expertise, camaraderie, elmering, demonstrating. Being able to use equipment you hadn't seen or used before. (I love that spudchucker!) Getting inexperienced operators experience under fire. Developing operating skill. Getting back on cw. Using different transceivers.

I've done one person Field Days. I've done two person Field Days. I've done Field Day from Block Island, a hill in Heath, and from atop Alander Mountain and Goat Peak. I've operated QRP and QRPp and 100 watts. The problem with small operations such as these is that I'm usually too tired from backpacking in and setting up to stay awake and operate! I think club operations can be the most fun and rewarding, since the work can be shared.

Computers can be useful -- as far as sending reports they aren't much different from a memory keyer. Preventing dupes and logging, I think, could be considered a real plus. But they're just an aid, not something that gives one operator a real edge over another.

Over the years, the ARRL has modified the rules greatly. They've added bonus points that help demonstrate traffic handling, solar power, publicity, novice operation, etc. I suppose they could add bonus points for non-computer operation. (But I don't miss those gigantic dupe sheets!)

The competitive aspect of Field day is an important part of the fun. Bragging rights: the pride that comes from coming in with a good score, at or near the top of your class. Say it's not a contest. Call it a friendly competition. Field Day would be the poorer for not having the sense of urgency that competition engenders — in a real emergency a sense of urgency would replace the desire for a big score. But without the adrenalin rush of competition Field Day would become just an outing.

SKYWARN NEWS

I'd like to thank all those who attended the SKYWARN classes in Connecticut and Westen Massachusetts. I look forward to working with all of you durring the 2005 weather season.

Here are the criteria that we will be looking for this summer

when a SKYWARN net is activated.

A GUIDE FOR REPORTING SEVERE WEATHER

- Tornadoes / funnel clouds (be wary of look a likes)
- Wall clouds, especially if they are rotating
- Any hail (be specific to size) (DO NOT USE "MARBLE SIZE" TO DESCRIBE SIZE)
- Winds (40 mph or greater, estimated or recorded)
- Damaging gusts (50mph or greater)
- Trees and power lines down. Large limbs down
- Structural damage to buildings, windows broken
- Rainfall:
 - 1 inch or greater in 1 hour 0
 - 2 inches or greater storm total
- Flash flooding:
 - Streams / rivers -also when nearing bank full
 - Coastal/Street

Include direction & distance from a known location Some things to remember during a net:

When calling from your town. Please specify if in MA or CT DO NOT relay reports that you here on repeaters in other coverage areas

DO NOT relay information from the WEATHER CHANNEL DO NOT relay information you hear on a scanner

WE WANT YOUR OBSERVATIONS!

After the storm has passed your location. **DO NOT** tell net control the storm has passed. Please stay off the air so that reports east o you can be taken. We don't need a summary of what has already happened. Please remember your safety during severe weather!
