Friday's meeting to feature CT ARES

This Friday's speaker will be Bill Covey, W1GTT, of the Connecticut ARES. Bill will be towing the CT ARES Region 4 MCU (Mobile Communications Unit) to the meeting and will be accompanied by the CT SEC Wayne Gronlund, N1CLV. Wayne will have a Power Point presentation for the meeting covering the MCU and EMCOMM.

From CT ARES: ARES (pronounced air'-ees) stands for the Amateur Radio Emergency Service. A program of the ARRL (American Amateur Relay League), ARES works with FEMA (the Federal Emergency Management Agency) and provides emergency communications services for agencies such as The American Red Cross, Salvation Army as well as the State Offices of Emergency Management. Many of our volunteers work in their local communities to help with emergency planning and communications assistance in time of need.

In a crisis, our first priority is to provide needed communications to the State Office of Emergency Management. This is usually done through their main HQ in Hartford and the five regional emergency operations centers. We go where they need us. The next priority is providing communications for the Red Cross chapters within Connecticut.

This promises to be a most interesting program. Even if you are not interested in ARES, you've got to come admire their well-equipped trailer complete with operating positions and all kinds of antennas and gear.



RBN: Reverse Beacon Network is always listening!

If you ever call CQ in CW, chances are that the Reverse Beacon Network has logged you. RBN includes skimmers (which pick up cw signals) thoughout the world. Go to http://www.reversebeacon.net/ --dx spots -- enter call sign, and recent spots of that call sign will appear with skimmer location time, frequency, relative signal strength, and time/date. Of course, there's a lot more to it than that, but play around with it...there are has possibilities for antenna comparisons, finding DX from a particular country, and (best of all?) your SOTA activation will be spotted on the SOTA Spots page, as long as you have posted an alert. Sorry, it's CW only -- just another reason to learn!

N1AW Arduino Keyer

I showed a breadboard version of my Arduino keyer at the HCRA DIY Show-and-Tell meeting in March (Photo 1). The advantage of the compact RBBB Freeduino board comes when it is time to migrate from the breadboard to a permanent build suitable for portable use. The perfboard to mount pullup resistors and other components fits into a 1"x2"x4" box from Radio Shack. The USB interface can be detached to use for another project, but can be reattached if I want to upgrade the software (Photo 2).

The final (but always upgradeable) unit is shown in Photo 3. The left hand switch turns the unit on and off. The middle switch detaches the keying line output if I just want to practice high speed sending without keying the transmitter. The push button switch, if pressed and released immediately toggles between iambic and semi-automatic keting; in bug mode the dah key can be used alone as a sideways straight key for slow sending. Two dahs signal iambic mode, a double-length dah indicates bug mode. A longer press of the push button results in a report of the current wpm speed (in Morse) when the button is released. While the push button is held down pressing the dit and dah paddles reduces or increases speed in one wpm units. The connectors on the back are for 6 to 12 VDC, a 1/8" stereo plug for the paddle, and a phono plug for the key line to the transmitter.

New England QSO Party (NEQP)

Date: First full weekend of May (May 4-5, 2013)

Have you seen all of last year's NEQP certificates that club members have been posting on Facebook? You too could pickup some new "wallpaper" for the shack and the fun begins this weekend!


As in years past, both HCRA club calls will be activated. Several of us will be operating under the WB1Z call, making the annual pilgrimage up to one of the more "rare" counties of Vermont. W1NY is staying put in Hampden County and will be run out of Ed-KB1NWH's shack. Ed has graciously opened up his shack to other club members to come operate. It's a great opportunity to try contesting for the first time.

The object of this contest is to contact as many New England stations (Connecticut, Maine, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, Rhode Island, Vermont) in as many New England counties as possible on 80-40-20-15-10m. (New England stations work anyone). That means WE'RE the DX! Another great thing about this contest is that you actually can work the entire contest AND sleep. It starts at 4pm Saturday EDT and pauses at 1am Sunday morning and resumes Sunday morning at 9am and ends at 8pm Sunday evening. Certificates are awarded to the top scorers (25) QSO minimum) in each New England county and there are a number of plagues that are awarded to top scorers. Every year HCRA sponsors the plaque for the highest score for single operator in Hampden County and many times it ends up going to a club member. Last year's plaque went to WN1E.

This is a very casual contest and QSO parties tend to be extra friendly. So, take some time this weekend to score some points and make sure to call CQ because stations all over the country are going to be looking to work you. Why, you ask? I spent a few months on a local New Jersey repeater and then I ended up moving to New York City. I stayed interested in radio but just couldn't find the time or space to do much but use my HT from time to time. 7 years later:

In May of 2012 (now living in Chesterfield) I opened a large bin with radio, power, tuner and a G5RV.



I drilled a hole through a golf ball and hung the antenna in the back yard (my arm hurt for a week) and ran coax into the house through the bottom of the basement door. I turned on the radio that night and heard OM2VL from the Slovak Republic working a pileup. I Hit the key, and gave my call sign (KB2TUD)--and he called The "Tango Uniform Delta" on the first try. I don't remember what happened after that but it's a QSL in LOTW so it must have happened.

I ended up making a bunch of 20M DX contacts that week and have been hooked ever since.
