BARGAINS GALORE !!!!!

Hams, like everyone else are feeling the effects of inflation and the loss of buying power. If you're like myself the amount of money you have to spend toward amateur radio is limited and you want to make every dollar count.

Well !!!!! the annual HCRA flea market is about to happen on the first Friday of May and here is a choice opportunity to be able to purchase many radio related items at very affordable prices. Bring some money (a large sum is not necessary) and be prepared for an evening of judicious shopping and horestrading.

When eyeballing flea market items, don't just look at items for face value. For example, a beat up minibox with two SO239 connectors mounted with a price tag of \$.25 is well worth it - just in the connectors. If you see things which are of no immediate need, don't pass them up, especially things which have coax connectors, phone plugs, phone jacks, etc. Everyone, sooner or later, is going to have to replace a broken antenna connector or key plug. Just recall the little items you've had to replace in the past year and when you didn't have a replacement, that meant a trip to the local radio emporium for a new part at net price. If you never homebrew or don't plan to, come anyway and pick up a few spare parts for your rig (probably at a very modest price). If you are planning to homebrew, plan to pick up items that are not available at radio supply houses, such as variable capacitors, R.F. chokes, and multi-deck rotary switches. Things such as resistors and small capacitors should be purchased on an as-needed basis because of their varied values.

If you see an item with a price tag on it and you don't wish to buy it at the listed price, don't be afraid to dicker with the seller. After all, he is selling what he doesn't need or no longer wants. Another ploy is to wait to the end of the evening and dicker over items that are still left - you're bargaining power has greatly increased as the seller probably does not wish to bring anything home (except money).

It'll be a great evening whether you buy anything or not so "Come On Down"!

COMMENT

After a very enjoyable 30 minute 10 meter SSB QSO with a ZS4 in South Africa, I came to some very interesting observations which never could have been brought out in the typical "5-9 Western Mass - will QSL" type of DX contact.

Dispensing with the preliminaries such as signal report, QTH, name, rig, and WX, we began an in depth discussion of:

Kenwood equipment-particularly my TS830S and his recently acquired pre-owned TS520S. He was interested in my comments on his transmitted audio quality since he was using a microphone that was not originally purchased with the rig. As time went on, he described his unorthodox way of connecting the microphone to the rig, due to the unavailability of the 4 pin microphone connector used by Kenwood.

At that point it occurred to me how fortunate we are being in the U.S.A., regardless of the energy crisis, inflation, and all the other things affecting our nation - for the most part at least we can almost obtain anything we want (for a nominal fee, of course). In other areas of the world fellow hams are faced with a virtual nonexistence of spare or replacement parts - regardless how much they are willing to pay for them.

I volunteered to send him the necessary connector and he replied with an offer of C.O.D. payment. My reply was that a QSL card would be sufficient.

"MORAL OF THE STORY"

Possibly it would behoove us to send a SO239, PL259, phone plug or some other little item (all to common to us) with a QSL card instead of the customary IRC's. Such a gesture may provide for a more practical exchange and greater chance of a return QSL from that station who is inundated with state-side cards. It would certainly further the fellowship between hams of the world.

FUTURE QSO

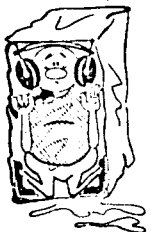

NEW TECHNOLOGY: SATELLITE TELEVISION

TVRO (Television, receive only) terminals are springing up in backyards like daisies! These are used to watch satellite TV. A guest speaker will be featured next season on this topic, and so that you're not completely lost, articles in ZB will cover the basics. Ten years ago a terminal cost \$35,000, now you can do it for under \$2,000!

HOW?

TV satellites are in synchronous orbits, which means that they rotate with the earth, so appear stationary to us. You point your antenna once, and voila!, no tracking or chasing

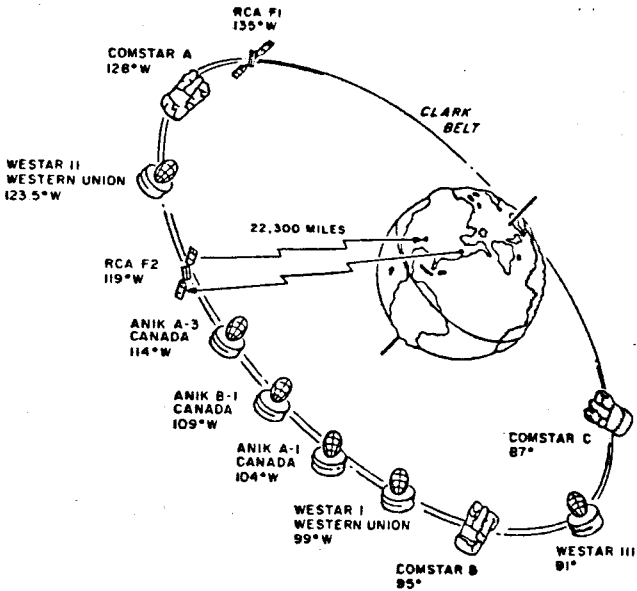


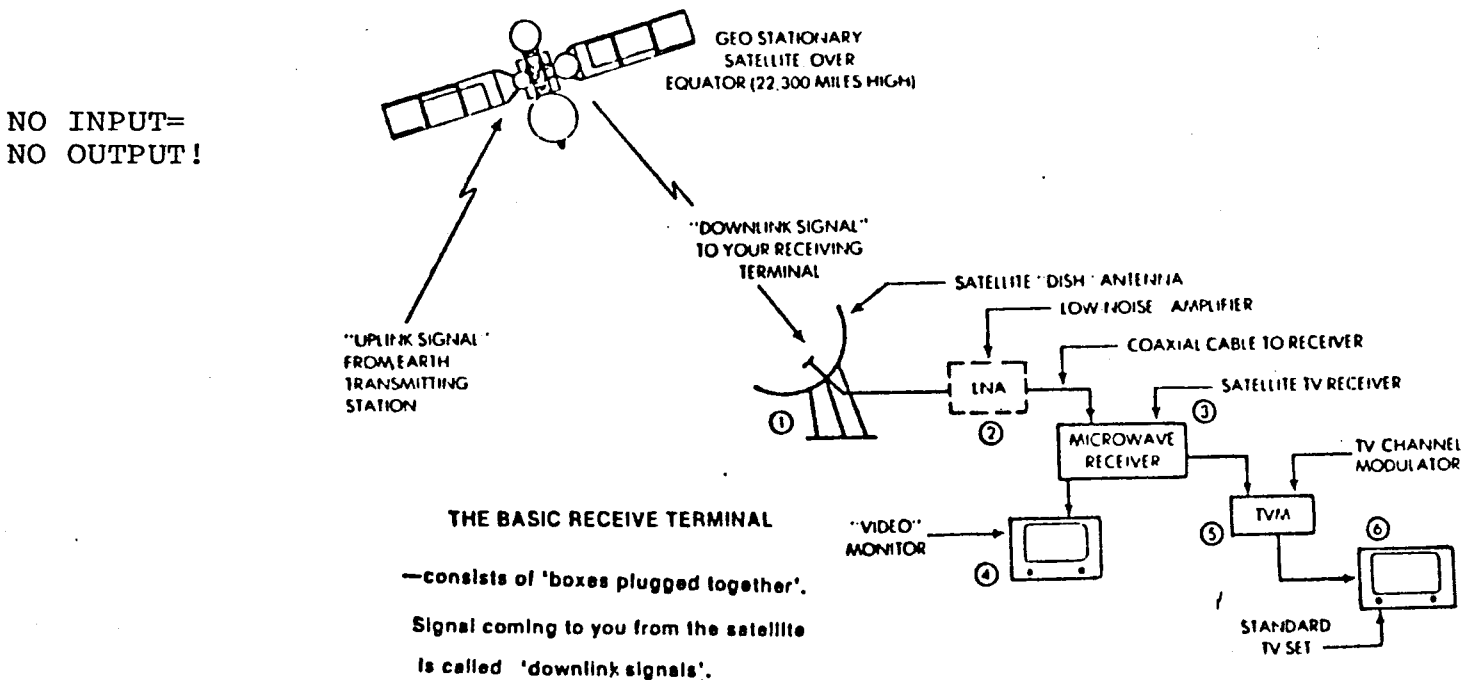
Fig. 1. Geostationary satellites.

is necessary. (See fig. 1) Each satellite carries a number of transponders, relaying various signals. SATCOM I, a typical example, carries 24 transponders. A certain signal strength is put into every area in the US, and is called the "footprint" of the satellite. Our area has a 38db level. You must have enough gain to get the signal at least 10db above the noise level. The signals are at 3.7-4 Ghz range. What equipment enables you to get a watchable picture?

EQUIPMENT SET UP

A basic TVRO set up consists of the following: An antenna, most commonly a dish with good gain figure, then an LNA, or low noise amplifier, that takes the signal and amplifies it, and sends it to a down converter, which processes it, and put it out on 70Mhz, or a TV channel of your choice. (see diagram below)

Future articles will include a chart of AZ-EL to various satellites from the Greater Springfield area, and more on antenna designs, LNA's from various manufacturers, and miscellaneous goodies. We want some input from the membership on how interested you are in this topic.

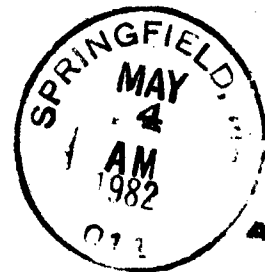
