

RADIO AND CAPE COD

LARRY KRAINSON, W1AST

For 8 years now, Cape Cod has become one of our favorite locations for Faye and I to camp. Each year we spend at least 2 weeks in North Truro and love it. Each year we are there we discover more and more to explore and learn about and we can't get enough. We spend most of our time on the "lower" Cape that is the area between Chatham and Provincetown. The "upper" Cape is known as Harwich/Brewster to Bourne/Falmouth. It all has to do with elevations.

As everyone knows, there is a deep radio history that goes back over 100 years on the Cape. Just 8 miles south of where we camp is the historic Marconi Transmission site or what is left of it. In 2013, the 110th anniversary of Marconi's first successful transatlantic two way communication between Wellfleet, MA and Poldhu, England. He proved to all the naysayers that wireless can go around the globe.

Today, all that is left of Marconi's site, on a cliff overlooking Marconi Beach is an overlook where you might be able to spot one or more of the concrete anchor points from the original towers. The Atlantic ocean has been claiming more and more of the cliff and the tower bases have fallen in and become consumed by the ocean.



Up until 2013, there was a kiosk with a model of the original Marconi station. I make a yearly stop to see the changing views and the day I was there, the kiosk was being torn down as the encroaching ocean had gotten too close for people to stand on the kiosk and be safe of not falling over the edge of the 100+ foot cliff. The model and information has been moved into the ranger station where there is further information on the station's history. But it is certainly worth the view and the time to stop and learn.

After visiting the Marconi transmission site, the next stop is 20 or so miles south in Chatham. It's very easy to get to from Wellfleet, turn left onto Route 6 and go south (compass south). In Orleans, where 28 intersects, take 28 south (again compass south as the roads actually say you're heading in a different direction). It's an interesting drive, with lots of scenery, salt marshes and bays, some shops and beautiful scenery. As you drive south, you'll be looking for Ryder Cove on the left and the Chatham Marconi Maritime Museum on the right. You may see the tall towers with Osprey nests up top and the brick buildings on the right. Turn in here when you see the sign.

The museum is very interesting as it tells the story of how it started as a Marconi transmission site, how the Military took it over and was using it to send and receive and decode the enemy's transmissions and then how it eventually became a RCA transmission site. There is a lot to learn about and it's all very interesting. Plus they have a full working ham station there as well.

Another stop, not directly related to Marconi but also very interesting is the French Cable Station Museum in Orleans. You actually drove past here on the way to the Chatham Marconi Maritime Museum as it's located across the street from the Christmas Tree Shops store. The French Cable museum is where the undersea cable than spans the Atlantic was laid. It went from Orleans to France. The station is famous for receiving news that Charles Lindbergh had landed in Paris and the info was then sent on to the rest of the United States. Other historic information was passed thru here as well.




The French Cable Station was in use from 1891 thru 1959. The museum is intact as it was used originally. There are docents available to give you tours and explain how the station operated. While it is not wireless, it is still very interesting and full of radios and test equipment. It's worth a stop here.

There is a book I am currently reading called "Thunderstruck" by Erik Larson. It is a true account of Marconi's successful attempt at wireless transmission in the late 1800's and early 1900's. There is also a true murder story interweaved in the book. So far I am a little more than half way thru the book. I find that the story of Marconi is very interesting and the murder mystery no so interesting. Here's a description from the authors page:

"The saga of how the lives of the inventor of wireless and of Britain's second most famous murderer (after Jack the Ripper) intersected during one of the greatest criminal chases of all time. The inventor was Guglielmo Marconi, the young Italian genius; the killer was Hawley Harvey Crippen, who murdered his overbearing wife and fled Britain with his mistress, unaware that Scotland Yard was hot on his heels. The book—an instant *New York Times* bestseller—brings to life a host of forgotten characters, including spirit mediums, ghost-



hunting physicists, Scotland Yard inspectors, and one of the great pioneers of forensic science. The climax occurs during a trans-Atlantic chase which, thanks to the miracle of Marconi's invention, was followed by millions of people around the world—with Crippen and his mistress completely unaware."


You can do all three places on the Cape in one day. But plan ahead as the French Cable Station Museum is only open a few days each week. So careful planning is needed to tour when they are open. The Chatham Marconi Museum is open all summer long, but again double check to make sure it will be open the day you visit, especially if it's not in summer. They did open special for me when I brought my scouts there this past April. The Marconi site in Wellfleet is open all the time.

SKYWARN RECOGNITION DAY

The annual SKYWARN Recognition day will be held on Saturday December 6, 2014. (0000-2400Z) This is the day when amateur radio operators visit the National Weather Service offices and contact other operators around the world. It helps strengthen the bond between the NWS and amateur radio operators. Ham radio operators play an important part during severe weather situations. Trained radio operators are the eyes and ears of the local NWS offices providing up to the minute information on current weather conditions. This enables the Weather Service to issue warnings and advisories that save lives, and property.

Please remember that this is NOT a contest!

The object of this event is to contact as many National Weather Service Offices as possible on 80 to 10 Meters as well as VHF & UHF, including repeaters. All modes including SSB, FM, AM, RTTY, CW, and PSK31. On digital modes the NWS stations will ID with "/NWS" after their callsign. They would also like you to provide a 1 or 2 word description of your current weather.

See how accurately you can measure W1AW/5 this month! The Frequency Measuring Test will begin 10:00 PM EST on Wednesday, November 12, 2014 (Thursday, November 13 at 0300 UTC). The standard Frequency Measuring Test format will be used, in which a single, unmodulated carrier is transmitted. Information on how to measure the frequency of a carrier is available at www.k5cm.com. All transmissions will be made from a single station in Oklahoma (K5CM). Submit the measured frequency using the data entry website provided by WA7BNM at, <http://www.b4h.net/fmt>. Results will be published immediately following the data entry deadline, which is 10:00 PM EST on Friday, November 14 (Saturday, November 15 at 0300 UTC). A Frequency Measuring Test certificate with the call sign W1AW/5 will be available to stations submitting a measured frequency within ± 10 Hz of any of the three transmitted frequencies. 
